Wilmington, N. Carolina, 25th Sept. 1795.
PROPOSALS, in writing, will be received at this office, until the 21st of October, for the purchase, by contract, all rations, quartermasters' supplies, and medical assistance, that may be wanted for the troops at this post, during the year 1796. The provisions must be made upon returns of the principal officer, showing the number of men for whom rations are required, and a receipt upon the return of the principal officer, for the number of rations delivered. A non-commissioned officer only be at the post, when any delivery is made. The non-commissioned officer charged with the receipt at the place, is afterwards to certify, and certify to, similar receipts and returns, as accurately as the nature of the case admits. And the accounts of the principal officer will be paid by the collector to the principal officer, on account.
Component parts of a ration.
One pound of bread or flour.
One pound of beef, or three quarters of a pound of pork.
One quart of rum, brandy, or whiskey.
One quart of salt.
One quart of vinegar, } per one hundred
One quart of peas, } rations.
One quart of apples.
