From the NEW-YORK DIARY.

The subscriber is authorized to inform the merchants and the public in general, that there is established a Post-Office at Hamburg, called the "American post expedition, for the convenience and safe correspondence between America and Europe." A packet for that purpose sails twice a week from Hamburg to London; letters going by way of Hamburg or Bremen, will be forwarded to any part of Europe, without being enclosed to any person residing in either of those places. A letter bag for that purpose should be lodged in the post office at the port from whence the vessel sails, and notice thereof should be given some days previous to their departure; as further security the letter should be put up in a sealed packet, inclosing a bill of their numbers, and directed to the American post expedition at Hamburg; should the vessel be bound to Bremen, letters from Hamburg or any part of Europe should be put up into a separate packet and directed as above.
