deserted. Whole battalions of the former have been sent home invalided, the others withdrawn on expiration of their terms of service. But as soon as one legion of the Cubans' enemies melts away another takes its place. The contest has seemed from the first entirely hopeless. Yet it is spiritedly continued from year to year by the insurgents, whose courage seems to rise with each reverse." It is not surprising that their heroismhas enlisted the sym pathies of many Americans, who know very little about the merit of their quarrel.
