it would be well for Mr. Hayes to understand that he is as a child playing with fire, and that the embers, now smouldering there may be fauned into a flame which may bring further woe and disaster upon a people who have suffered too much and too long already at the hands of the party of which Mr. Hayes is now the leader and champion.
