No person who shall hold any office or place of trust or profit under the United States, or any Department thereof, or under this State, or under any other State, or government, shall hold or exercise any other office or place of trust or profit, under authority of this State, or be eligible to a seat in either House of the General Assembly: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall extend to the officers in the militia, Justices of the peace, commissioner of public charities, or commissioners for special purposes.

Hill is yet a member of the General Assembly of the State, and Mr. King is a city officer, and to them, in our opinion, the law plainly applies.
