Austria has called upon England to fulfill her engagements under the tripartite treaty. — The *Times* deprecates a needless panic. The Superior Court.

Air Brakes for the W. C. & A. R. R.

We understand that air brakes for use on the Wilmington Columbia & Augusta R. R. have been ordered, and that every passenger train on that road will be fitted with them. These brakes, it is well known, are worked by the engineer from the engine, and their practical ability are such that they are fast coming into use on the leading lines of travel. By their use trains going at full speed can be stopped in a very short distance, say two hundred yards, from the spot on which they are applied, thus adding greatly to the safety of the travellers. Besides a great desideratum gained in the saving of time, every moment of which is becoming of importance now in these days of fast mail schedules.

The Canal Meeting.

An adjourned meeting was held last night at the Court House in the interest of the New River Canal, Mr. Henry Nutt, in the Chair, and W. P. Oldham, Esq., Secretary. It being in order the Committee appointed to take into consideration the proposition made by the New River Canal Company to the citizens of Wilmington presented their report which was received and read, after which Mr. Nutt addressed the meeting in that forcible and earnest style peculiar to this gentleman, giving an interesting description of the vast resources and wealth stored up in the Eastern part of the State, all of which Wilmington was debarred from reaching for the want of water communication with Pamlico Sound which could only be reached by the construction of the proposed Canal. Mr. Nutt then discussed the proposition made by the Canal Company to the people of Wilmington, and stated that the plan submitted was one the people could and should accept as the Company assumed all the risk, and at the same time the security thus offered was more than ample for the loan asked for by the Company. Mr. Nutt regretted the lethargy and want of enterprise now prevailing among our citizens, and hoped that the people would soon see their true interest and act accordingly. Messrs. John Colville and James Sprunt, and Capt. H. G. Gilbert and Capt. Jno. W. Galloway, and others addressed the meeting. Mr. Colville moved that a committee of three be appointed to procure subscriptions for the Canal which was adopted, the appointment of the committee to be made by the Chairman. The meeting then adjourned.

In response to this we can only refer our antiquated friend to sec. 7 art. 14 of Amendments to the Constitution, which reads as follows:

Sec. 7. No person who shall hold any office or place of trust or profit under the United States, or any Department thereof, or under this State, or under any other State, or government, shall hold or exercise any other office or place of trust or profit, under authority of this State, or be eligible to a seat in either House of the General Assembly: *Provided*, That nothing herein contained shall extend to the officers in the militia, Justices of the peace, commissioners of public charities, or commissioners for special purposes.

Of the new Aldermen, James Lowrey is, or was, a U. S. official; J. C. Hill is yet a member of the General Assembly of the State, and Mr. King is a city officer, and to them, in our opinion, the law plainly applies. As for Mr. Foster, it is claimed that he was not a *bona fide* resident of the ward at the time of his election, and if this can be established, it will throw him overboard. Even if all four mentioned should lose their seats it will not impede the organization of the new Board as there will still be left six, which will form a quorum, and these six are authorized by law to fill all vacancies.
