Chat About Trees-No. 4.

Residents of Wilmington long used to its peculiar climate, are net aware how favorably it compares with towns north and south and west of us, as having so many elements necessary to the rapid growth and development of shade trees not common elsewhere. The magnolia grandiflora flourishes as well as in its native element, its northern limit as noticed by Bartram a century ago, being about Dr. Bellamy's plantation in Brunswick county. It was a fivorite tree with the settlers, and all along up the river some of the fine old trees are still standing. The magnolia, at the limestone quarry up the river, was one of the largest on the river, but was killed by the raftsmen building their fires too near its roots and trunks. Very many of these trees in our town are symmetrical and healthy, and are entirely free from the depredations of insects; they will stand the autumnal storms very well, suffering most in those

winters when there is much sleet. It

would be well to extend their cultivation

further. The great obstacle being in the

rearing of seedlings, and the slow growth

of the trees is perhaps the chief cause of

their slow extension. In the last year

many beautiful young trees were planted

and the coming year there will be as many,

more perhaps. It is not so difficult to raise plants from the seed if they are sowed in a box, as this secures against the depredations of ground moles: We were sorry to see at least one fine magnolia, of at least ten years growth, in a private lot not very favorably situated for its best development, however, almost ruined by the long continued drought. Magnolias are cultivated as far west as Salisbury and Salem, but their development is not vigorous there.

In our climate there is no need for an annual festival of tree-planting, a custom which is slowly gaining ground in the Western States, and something similar is encouraged by Prof. Sargent in Massachusetts, but it might with propriety be adopted here to encourage the rearing of the more reautiful of our shade frees in the streets. It was a mistaken policy which led to the destruction of the trees in our business streets. It would be well at this late day to place fine trees at proper intervals where others have been destroyed, but it should not be such a pucrile attempt as that on Market street, between Fourth and Fourteenth streets. By singular good luck the great majority of these trees lived, but they might as well have been ten years older as the litit is utterly useless to plant trees in any street in which the grade has not been permanently established. It is to be hoped latter policy strictly, he will be sure to that when the row of trees on Third street, between Dock and Nun, is again taken in hand, that the old and unsightly ones will be replaced by others more valuable. Let it be remembered that every tree planted increases the amount of health-giving exygen, besides being a great protection against the spread of flames in time of great fires.
