Cane Fibre Works.

The work of rebuilding the above named works was commenced some three months since under the direction of Mr. the National Fibre Co. The buildings manner and the machinery for the successful prosecution of the enterprise is being placed in position. We were shown through the works this morning by Mr. Perkins and as but very few of our citizens have any conception of the magnitude of the enterprise, we will give a hasty sketch of the buildings and modus operandi of the preparation of the pulp through the different departments.

The main building is 120 feet by 45.
