Ammonia for Rheumatism.

What is a Registered Letter?

The question is very often asked: What is the difference between a registered letter and any other,? The difference is that a registered letter does not go in the mail proper. It passes from hand to hand outside the mail pouches, every person through whose hands it passes being required to sign a receipt for it on passing it over to the next in transit. The person holding the last receipt is thus al-ways able to show who is accountable for the loss. The responsibility rests upon the man who has signed a receipt for the registered package and who is not able to produce the package or a receipt from somebody else for it. The safest way to send money is by money-order. Where it does not go to a money-order office it should always be sent in a registered package. Money ought not to be sent in an ordinary letter under any circumstances. There is no possible way of "tracking" such a letter.

Directions for Canning Fruit in Self-Sealing Jars.

Steam the jars over hot water and then rinse them in it to prevent breakage. The fruit should be boiling hot throughout; that is, every particle of it must boil. If cooked through it keeps all the better. Fill the jars to overflowing while the fruit is boiling hot; put the top on carefully, (this must go in the hot water also) see that the rubber ring is fitted in its place smoothly, and immediately screw the lock-rings down tight. When the fruit cools, tighten the rings again. The fruit will keep without sugar, but it is better to put in as much sugar as is required for "stewed fruit" when it is put up, as it takes less sugar when cooked into the fruit, and it is then ready for immediate use. Tomatoes can be put up in the same way. Remember, that the principal is that the heat drives the fixed air out of the fruit, whiich produces decay, and that sealing it up air tight while boiling hot; is required to keep it sound.

By Pearson, C. J.-Henry Brunhild et al. vs. J. H. Freeman et al., from New Hanover ; affirmed.

Brunhild vs. Freeman. Where there is contract, if the parties cannot agree upon the meaning of it, it is for the Jury or the court to say what is the meaning, It is not what either party thought but what they agreed.

By Bynum, J.-State vs. Wilkes Morris, from New Hanover, Error. [No digest of opinion reported.] By Faircloth, J-State vs. John H

Strauss, from New Hanover. Reversed. The defendant was indicted for engaging in the business of liquor dealer without a license so to do, under an ordinance of the city of Wilmington, which provides: 'Any person refusing or neglecting to pay the license taxes assessed against him for the privilege of doing business, for the space of five days, shall be subject to a criminal prosecution, &c." The case comes up on a special verdict, and it does not appear that the indictment alleged that the defendant had neglected or refused to pay the tax for five days. Held This is a fatal error. Nothing can be added to a special verdict.
