The Thermometer. From the United States Signal Office at this place we obtain the following report of the thermometer, as taken this morning at 7:31 o'clock:

Board of Aldermen. A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon, when the following proceedings were had: Further time was granted the Finance Committee for report in the matter of Geo. Davis in regard to interest on coupons.

The Committee on police made a report recommending the appointment of Joseph Bowden as special policeman at the Carolina Central Railway depot.

The amendments to the tax ordinance, offered at a previous meeting, were referred to the Committee on Finance for conference with the Board of Audit and Finance.

A communication from Wilmington Hook and Ladder Company, No. 1, asking monthly appropriations, was referred to the Fire Department Committee.

A petition from milk dealers, asking a reduction on caris, was, on motion, indefinitely postponed.

A report from the Superintendent of Health was read and placed on file. The matter of the salary of the Superintendent of Health was referred to the City Attorney.

Permission was granted, on approval of the Committee, to T. J. Southerland to erect a wooden shed on his lot, on Second street.

All applications for positions of Detectives were, on motion, laid on the table. On motion of Alderman Foster, it was resolved (in substance), that all commissions or appointments as special police, made or issued previous to June 1st, 1877, are hereby revoked...

Moved by Alderman Foster that applications for Deputy Clerk of the Market be deferred until the next meeting of the Board, when final action will be taken. Carried.

The Committee on Streets and Wharves reported that they had examined the bridge built across the railroad, on Sixth street, and think it is well and substantially constructed for the amount agreed upon to be paid by the city for said bridge.

It was moved by Alderman Bowden, that the salary of Mr. L. M. Williams, Clerk of the Market, be increased to \$50 per month, to date from the 1st of September next. Unanimously carried.

It was moved by Alderman Lowery that a lamp be placed at Boney Bridge, on Fourth street. Carried. The Board then adjourned.

Town of Burgaw. BURGAW, August 27th, 1877. EDITOR REVIEW:

The finishing touches to the location here of the county site of Pender were given here to-day by the official action of the Board of County Commissioners. There was a large gathering of the people demonstrating that the Board should carry out the will of the voters in the choice of Burgaw.

That the public buildings of the county shall be located upon the seventy-three (73) acres of land given by the Railroad Company.

That the Court House shall be located upon Fremont street, on the east side of the railroad, one hundred and seventy-seven (177) yards from the road, and upon a broad avenue running from the warehouse.

That the county offices, official books, papers and other county equipments shall be taken from South Washington to Burgaw. To that end a contract was made with Mr. S. P. Hand to fit up a temporary Court House, and to have it ready as early as practicable.
