FIRST DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The adjourned meeting of the 61st Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was opened yesterday morning with religious services in Christ Church.

The Convention met after Divine service, and was called to order by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll, and reported forty-two Clergymen and Lay Delegates from twenty-seven Parishes present.

R. H. Battle offered the following as a substitute for the report of the committee on the line of division:

Resolved, That the line of division of the Diocese be, and is hereby, referred to the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, with the respectful request that they suggest a proper line of division to the Convention tomorrow morning, at 9 o'clock; which was declared to be out of order.

On motion of Gen. W. B. Cox, the Convention adjourned to 4:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by the Bishop.

Rev. N. Collin Hughes moved to reconsider the resolution dividing the diocese. Declared to be out of order.

Rev. John Kiernan called up the amendment offered by Mr. Wilkes in reference to the line of division, and moved to lay it on the table.

H. A. Loudon called for a vote by orders, and the motion to lay on the table was lost by the following clerical vote: Ayes 13, noes 28.

R. H. Smith moved to postpone the consideration of Mr. Wilkes' amendment until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock, which motion was lost.

The Rev. Dr. Wetmore called for the question on the adoption of Mr. Wilkes' amendment when it was lost.

The resolution of the Committee before the Convention was as follows: Resolved, That the proposed new diocese shall be composed of the following counties, to-wit: Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Chowan, Bertie, Halifax, Edgecombe, Wilson, Johnston, Wake, Chatham, Randolph, Davidson, Rowan, Iredell, Catawba, Burke, McDowell, Caldwell, Wilkes, Surry, Alexander, Davie, Yadkin, Forsyth, Stokes, Guilford, Rockingham, Caswell, Alamance, Orange, Person, Granville, Nash, Franklin, Warren, Northampton, Hertford and Gates, making in all forty counties.

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Rev. New Jersey's Earthquake.

New Jersey, Sept. 11.—The honest chroniclers of this section of New Jersey were still sadly puzzled by the shaking that they received yesterday morning when an earthquake shock. It forms the most important topic throughout Burlington and a portion of Mercer, Ocean, and Monmouth counties.

At the time of the shock the sky was perfectly clear, but everybody seems to have first heard the rumbling sound in the air, and have instinctively gazed upward. Then it seemed to come from the ground at their feet, and to have gone outward before they had the faintest notion of its cause.

What Fritz Remembers.

RICHMOND, Va. Sept. 11.—The institution of speculators in Washington of a suit against the principal millers of the United States for an alleged infringement of a patent process for grinding flour has resulted in a discovery.

In a deposition furnished to Messrs. Hazell, Crenshaw & Co., which will be filed in due time, Fritz says he used the identical process of milling flour that is now alleged to be an infringement upon the patent used by this Washington man as long ago as 1847, in the State of New York, and ten years earlier in France.

The Election in Maine. PORTLAND, ME., Sept. 11.—Hon. Eugene Hale telegraphs that Washington county gives 500 Republican majority; Hancock, 1,000; Waldo, 750; and says Knox towns will increase this Fifth District majority.

The counties given last night as doubtful prove to be Republican to-day, leaving the Democrats only Knox and Lincoln counties, which they had last year, but probably two Senators in Republican counties.

The Senate stands 28 Republicans and 2 Democrats; the House, 97 Republicans and 26 Democrats, 7 Greenbackers, one from Livermore and one from Oxford, and 50 not reported.

But few returns have been received in regard to Constitutional amendments. So far as heard from that limiting the elective franchise received 2,587 votes in its favor and 3,097 were cast against it.
