Henry James, Jr., has a short story in this number, Bret Harte a poem, John Burroughs a tramping paper entitled "A Bed of Boughs," and George M. Towle a sketch of the career of Thiers. The opening illustrated article is one of Scribner's sporting series, entitled "Canvas back and Terrapin," by W. McKay Laffan, of Baltimore, illustrated by the author himself.
