It is thought that the United States District Court will finish up the business before it this afternoon and adjourn.
Fifteen cargoes of salt have been received at this port since last July 1st, just four months ago, while but 13 cargoes of the same were entered here for the entire fiscal year ending last June 30th.

Superior Court.
The Superior Court is still occupied with the trial of the murder case from Bladen county, the evidence for the defense being heard to-day. It is thought that the trial will hardly be concluded and a result reached before the end of the term, which will be on Saturday evening.

Custom House Figures
From the Custom House at this place we learn that the imports here during the past month amounted to \$3,495 88, gold, in value; the tonnage duties for the same period were, in currency, \$1,501.80; the hospital dues were \$112.11 and the entrance and clearance fees and marine documents were \$248.60. The exports for the month amounted to \$148,629.

Meteorological.
From the U. S. Signal Office at this place we have the following report of the weather for the month of October:
Mean daily barometer, 30.073; mean daily thermometer, 65.4; mean daily humidity, 75.3; highest barometer, 30.408, (date 7th); lowest barometer, 29.361, (date 4th); monthly range, 1.042; maximum temperature, 82 (date 16th & 17th); minimum temperature, 46°, (23rd); monthly range of temperature, 37°; greatest daily range of temperature, 28° (date 25th); least daily range of temperature, 8°; mean of maximum temperature, 75.3; mean of minimum temperature 56.7; mean daily range of temperature, 18.6; total rainfall, 6.68 inches; prevailing wind, N. E.; total movement of wind 4,757; maximum velocity and direction of the wind, 30 miles per hour—S. W.—4th; number of days on which rain fell, 10.

Snake in the House.
Mr. Jno. G. Bauman found a large chicken snake this morning comfortably coiled up in the hallway of his residence, corner Fifth and Dock streets. His snake-scorpion was promptly dispatched and afterwards embalmed in spirits for exhibition. He measured three feet and three inches.

Vicious Dog.
Last evening, as one of the route boys of the Review was delivering his papers to subscribers, and while on Mulberry between Fifth and Sixth streets, a fierce dog sprang over a fence and attacked him, bit the boy on the leg. Complaints were lodged with the Chief of Police who this morning sent a policeman with the boy to point out the vicious canine.

U. S. District Court.
The attention of His Honor Judge Brooks was directed this morning to passing judgment upon Chas. L. Lawton, who was charged with embezzlement of money from the Postoffice at Magaglia, and who plead guilty to the charge. The sentence was 12 months at hard work in the penitentiary at Sing Sing; also to the case of Conrad Housman, who is charged with obtaining a letter from the Postoffice in this city through fraud and deceit. This case was set for hearing this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

City Court.
The first case called this morning was that of Fanny Gore, spoken of a few days since. His Honor said \$3 fine.
A young colored man who was arrested asked a continuance of his case, which was granted.

Paul Webster, white, a seafaring man, was adjudged to be guilty of \$3 worth of disorderly conduct and ordered confined until paid.
John E. Shaw and W. T. Finch, arrested for creating a disturbance at Lippitt's Hall, by officer Green, last night were brought before His Honor this morning. Shaw was discharged and Finch was ordered into the cell for 25 days, unless he pay a fine of \$25.

Dennis Betts, who was one of the participants in the aforesaid row, but who had probably been released upon bail, was not present this morning but will probably put in an appearance to-morrow morning by virtue of Mayor Dawson's order to the police, which was to arrest Betts on sight. His Honor, after concluding his case this morning, looked as though he was glad, the last one had been disposed of, and he seized his hat and slapped it on his head with a vim, when he stepped down from his judicial seat. This of course indicated that the Court had adjourned.

Uniformed Postal Officials.
Postmaster-General Key has issued an order stating that "inasmuch as the public interest seems to require that all employees of this department who, in the performance of their official duties are obliged to handle the mails in public, should be known by some outward designation, it is therefore:
Ordered, That each railroad post-office clerk, route agent, mail route messenger, and local agent be, and is hereby required to provide himself a uniform within sixty days from this date, the same to be worn at all hours when on duty, and to be made according to the accompanying specifications.

The uniforms are to be as follows, according to the instructions issued by the Department:
Coat—Indigo blue, sack, double-breasted, with three buttons on each side and two on each sleeve—in length, midway between the hip-joint and knee.
Vest—Single-breasted, without collar, six buttons high.
Pants—Of same material, 3/4 inch welt on outside seam.
Hat—Navy cap, three inches deep, with corded black silk band.
The above described suit to be worn while on duty.

CAROLINA.
Raleigh Observer: Col. L. M. Blakely, of Pitt, in transporting his blooded stock from the Weldon fair lost his fine black stallion "Night Shade," which was so universally admired at the fair. Col. Blakely valued this horse at \$10,000.
Charlotte Observer: The Atlanta Constitution confirms the rumor to the effect that the negro, Clark B. Gormely, now in jail here for robbing the house of a colored woman and setting fire to the building, was a member of the Georgia Legislature.
Weldon News: Robert Pennington, living near Gaston, shot himself Saturday inflicting injuries which resulted in his death yesterday; he was loading his gun when it slipped from his hand and went off.

Durham Plant: A little daughter of our old friend Jefferson Brooks, of Person county, some two years old, was badly mangled by a sow a few days ago. One arm was so badly chewed up that the attending physicians, Drs. Merritt and Robertson, think amputation inevitable. It was badly bitten in several other places and but for the timely assistance of its father and grand-father who were near by would have suffered death.

Charlotte Observer: Yesterday afternoon, Fred May and Anderson Hall, two negro men, got into a scuffle in a bar room on the north side of College street, in which Hall threw May a violent fall. The latter became very angry, and drawing a knife stabbed Hall in the side, a few inches below the arm-pit, cutting a gash three inches and a half in depth. Hall was carried to the office of Dr. Battle who pronounced the wound a very dangerous one indeed, the knife having come within an inch of penetrating the heart. May, at last accounts, had not been arrested.

Raleigh Observer: A specimen of that venomous and much dreaded reptile, *Crotalus*, more familiarly known as the hooded snake, was left at the Agricultural Museum yesterday by Mr. John T. McKay of Fayetteville. This snake carries a horn of 1 1/2 inches in length at the end of his tail, and in battling takes the end of the tail in its mouth, and reaching the prey, thrusts the horn with deadly effect. Mr. McKay, who is a gentleman of undoubted veracity, says he knows of a case where a friend of his was chased by one of these reptiles. He sought refuge behind a tremendous white oak, and the snake, in striking, plunged his horn in the tree. In twenty minutes every leaf on the oak was withered, and the next day the tree was dead. Mr. McKay captured this snake in the cellar of a badly decayed house near Fayetteville; he is strongly of the opinion that the snake must have horned the house, thus causing its decay.
