DUPLICITY OF THE PRESIDENT.

Democrats who are still hungry for office under the administration of Hayes, and expending their hopes, time, and energies to that end, are not only injuring themselves in this vain and demoralizing pursuit, but actually aiding the President in his course of disintegration of the Southern Democracy.

"Another thing I will mention—don't rely too implicitly on recommendations and endorsements. Hayes' own endorsement is worth nothing in the Departments. He is importuned to sign papers, and after signing them instructs the Departments not to consider his endorsement."

"Thank you, thank you," said the President heartily. "You flatter me, indeed you are kind. Yes, sir, I am deeply in earnest. I am the President of the United States, not of any political party. I expect to stand by my policy."

"How will your policy affect the November elections?" "Pennsylvania will go Democratic and New York will send a Democrat to succeed Mr. Conkling in the Senate. New Hampshire may go Democratic."

Reporter—What the President was about to say to the Pennsylvanians, you didn't hear?"

Gen. B.—No, that was intended for Republicans only. And what we heard was intended for the Democrats. You see how easy and pleasant it is to be the President of a great country—to know no party."

Gen. B.—He proposes to remove the carpet baggers from office wherever they are obnoxious to the people, and then, all things being equal, he will give the offices to Hayes Republicans. Occasionally a Democrat may get in. Senator Hill, it is said, has assurance from the President that the United States Marshalship of Georgia shall be given to a Democrat. A few conspicuous instances of the sort will give to his policy some prominence."

ON AND AFTER MONDAY NEXT the STREET CARS will commence running at 6 o'clock in the morning, and run every 15 minutes, each way from the Market House, until 8:30 o'clock, except Saturdays, when they will run until 10:30 o'clock.

The Cars will alternate between the Cemetery and Brooklyn.

There will be a Car to the Cemetery every 15 minutes, also one to Brooklyn every 30 minutes.

There will be a sign on the rear of the Car just over the dash board, designating which place the Car is going—either Brooklyn or the Cemetery.

Persons wishing to take the cars on either of the three Railroads, will find the Street Cars the cheapest and most comfortable way of reaching them.

Persons arriving in the city will always find a car at the upper end of Front street near Union Depot, which will take them to any of the Hotels for 5 cents, or to any other part of the Street Car Line.
