Military Matters.

The Adjutant-General of the State, by order of the Governor, the Commander in Chief, has issued the following orders relative to the organization of the colored military companies into battalion organizations. It will be seen that the companies in this city will form part of the Fifth Battalion and that the election for field officers is to take place in this city on Wednesday, the 21st inst:

GENERAL HEADQUARTERS,
STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA
Raleigh, Nov. 8th, 1877: }

[GENERAL ORDERS No. 17.]
I. In accordance with the sixth section of the "Act for the establishment of the North Carolina State Guard," the colored volunteer company organizations now existing shall be organized into battalions as follows:

IN THE FIRST DISTRICT.
The Oak City Blues, Newbern Rifle Cadets, Newbern Guards and Oberlin Vance Guard, shall constitute the Fourth Battalion N. C. S. G., and each of the above named companies shall be designated by letter as follows:
" A, Oak City Blues.
" B, Newbern Rifle Cadets.
" C, Newbern Guards.
" D, Oberlin Vance Guard.

IN THE SECOND DISTRICT:
The Hanover Light Infantry, Cape Fear Light Infantry, Howard Light Infantry, Fayetteville Rifle Guard, and Charlotte Blues shall constitute the Fifth Battalion N. C. S. G., and each of the above named companies shall be designated by letters as follows:
Company A, Hanover Light Infantry.
" B, Cape Fear Light Infantry.
" C, Howard Light Infantry.
" D, Fayetteville Rifle Guard.
" E, Charlotte Blues.

11. In pursuance of section six (6) of the act above named, the company officers of the Fourth Battalion N. C. S. G., are hereby warned to appear at Goldsboro on Wednesday, the 21st day of November, 1877, for the election of a major for said battalion.

The company officers of the Fifth Battalion, N. C. S. G., are hereby warned to appear at Wilmington on Wednesday, the 21st day of November, 1877, for the election of a lieutenant-colonel and major for said battalion.

Each commissioned officer in the respective battalions will be entitled to one vote, and may be represented by proxy in the election above ordered.

The meeting will be presided over by the senior officer present. The proceedings will be certified by the president and secretary, and forwarded to this office.

The rules for the election of officers, prescribed in General Order No. 4, will be followed.

WHEREAS, The law of the State, representing the religious sentiment of our people, makes it my duty so to do,

Vance, Governor of North Carolina, do issue this, my proclamation, appointing Thursday, the 29th day of November, instant, as a day of public prayer and thanksgiving to Almighty God for peace, health and the bounteous fruits of the earth and other blessings wherewith he has blessed us during the passing year.

And I earnestly invoke the people to suspend as far as may be practicable, all secular business, and to assemble together on that day in their usual places of worship for religious services, and to remember that our praises will be incomplete unless with a liberal hand we also relieve the poor, the widow and the orphan.

Done at our city of Raleigh, on this, the 9th day of November, in the year of our Lord, 1877, and in the one hundred and second year of our independence.
