#### Autumn Leaves.

A very pretty way to ornament any plain article of furniture, a cabinet or paneled trinket cupboard, boxes, jars, trays, etc., is by the following simple process Having collected the ferns and forward the same to the managers at leaves in all their endless variety, pre- Clinton. pare them thus: Lay the leaves one by one on a piece of soft paper, wrong side up, and with a sharp penknife pare off the projecting veins, so that there will be as little roughness as possible; then place them in books, with heavy weight, and press them smoothly, leaving them there until you are ready to use them. Prepare the article by painting it black, using a fine brush for the purpose; because it will leave fewer traces. When this is perfectly dry and hard, give it a coat of fine, transparent varnish; and before it has become entirely dry, lay on the leaves and fern sprays in graceful groups, according to fancy, pressing them smoothly down, so that every part will adhere. When they are entirely dry, give it another coat of the same transparent varnish, going over the whole surface, leaves and all. If you wish to bronze the black ground in imitation of the Japanese comes smeary. It never should be wiped or cleaned. It is always clean and as it were a little bronze powder over the sticky always new, without requiring the least care. varnish after putting on the leaves, then rubbing it lightly with a soft rag to burnish it. These ornamentations are both permanent and effective.
