Postponement.
Young Williams, who was arrested a few days ago in this city upon a telegram from Justice Powers of Fayetteville, charging him with highway robbery and who was subsequently carried back to Fayetteville by Capt. Albert Worth, was called up for a preliminary examination on yesterday, but owing to the fact that the man who was knocked down and robbed on the highway near Fayetteville did not put in an appearance, a hearing of the case was postponed until to-morrow.
A Lot of Cotton.
There were 32,618 bales of cotton on hand yesterday at this port. This, at \$50 a bale (calculating the average at 500 pounds to the bale and 10 cts a pound for the cotton) makes the nice little sum of \$1,630,900.
The growing importance of Wilmington as a cotton market is thus plainly apparent and, judging the immediate future by the standard of this year and the last, the indications are favorable for a still larger business in cotton next year. A large proportion of the staple is shipped from this port direct to foreign countries and when we get next year the new Compresses which are to be erected all in good working order, it is doubtful if they will be able to do more than keep up with the ironclads.

Coast Inland Canal.
The Washington correspondent of the New York Herald writing under date of Thursday, says: The Huron disaster has drawn attention afresh to the advantages of a ship canal connecting Chesapeake Bay with the inland waters of the Carolinas, and Mr. Marshall Parks, of Norfolk, will shortly present to Congress, on behalf of the citizens of that place a memorial for a Government enterprise supplementary to the Albemarle Canal, which is already in excellent working order, for merchant vessels and steamers of medium draught trafficking between Chesapeake Bay and Pamlico Sound. Mr. Parks proposes a plan by which, at comparatively light expense, this canal could be extended through all the small sounds inside of the Atlantic seaboard between Norfolk and Wilmington, and even to Savannah and the Gulf of Mexico.
