Yesterday's Fire—A Church Burnt

About 9 o'clock yesterday morning the alarm of fire was sounded, and upon inquiry we ascertained that the Zion African Episcopal Methodist Church, of which Rev. Gabriel Farmer is pastor, was the scene of the conflagration. The sexton built a fire in the furnace which heated the edifice, about 6 o'clock in the morning, and the cause of the fire is supposed to have been from a defective flue. When first discovered the flames were breaking through the roof at the east end of the building and soon the alarm attached rang out its peal for help for the last time, as the bell which has heretofore done good service in this respect succumbed to the intensity of the heat. The pastor who was appointed to this church at the last Conference was to have preached his first sermon yesterday to the congregation of that church.

The building was insured for \$2,500 in a company represented by Mr. Norwood Giles. Most of the church furniture was saved, including the Bible, etc, though the benches were very much damaged in the hurry of removing them. Never did a fire department work better than on this occasion and to them belongs the praise of saving other buildings in the neighborhood which were in great peril.

We have received an account of the closing public exercises of this fine institution of learning at Lillington, in Pender county, as they occurred at the close of the session on Friday last. The public examination of the students in spelling, reading, arithmetic, grammar, geography, and higher branches, indicated thoroughness and success on the part of the scholars and a very creditable devotion on the part of the teacher, Mr. Andrew J. McIntire, who has the reputation of an experienced and efficient instructor. The trustees are live men, viz. Messrs. G. F. Walker, John Scott, S. S. Satchwell, Grattan Williams, B. O. Bordeaux, Bruce Williams, and Sheriff A. H. Paddison. Several addresses were delivered on the occasion, and every thing went off handsomely. The academy was incorporated one year ago, and is now a decided success. Board in the village is cheap, and the price of tuition corresponds with the hardness of the times. Amid the general prevalence of ignorance, poverty, and prostration, this is all essential and wise.
