Wholesale Dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits turpentine, rosin, and naval stores of apy kind, and cotton; also wood and coal dealers.) All Hotels, Boarding Houses, Restaurants and Eating Houses are required by law to pay a tax of One Half Per Cent. on gross 1e-

The Tax will be due January 1st, and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of July, 1877.
