St. Paul's New Organ. The new organ ordered by the congregation of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, through Mr. P. Heinsberger, has been received and is now at that gentleman's music store on Market street. It is a very handsome instrument and from the manufactory of George Jardine & Son, New York. It is the No. 3 1/2 pipe organ size with open diapason, 39 pipes, clarionet flute and diapason base, 58 pipes, gamba, 39 pipes, violino and violoncello, 58 pipes, with tremulant and pedal coupler. Schr J. G. Stover. The Schr. James G. Stover, which recently put into this port in distress bound from Jacksonville, Fla., to Boston loaded with lumber, and reported as having discharged cargo and repaired on the 11th, was launched from the railways yesterday, after having a coat of tar and pitch put over her bottom by her owners. She was taken upon the railway on the 10th, inst., with such of her cargo as was contained in her hold, but no repairs were deemed necessary by her master, and upon being launched she was found to be leaking worse than ever. Her owners think that with the coat of tar and pitch given her she will be able to reach Boston without further trouble. The manufacture of paper from wood has reached the altitude of perfection in Canada. The Duplin Canal.

A meeting of the citizens of Wilmington will be held in the Rooms of the Produce Exchange on Tuesday next, the 8th inst. at 3 o'clock, for the purpose of hearing the report of A. R. Black, Esq., respecting the Duplin Canal, and with a view of taking action thereon. The call is signed by Messrs. Edward Kidder, H. B. Short, E. Peschau, R. E. Calder, D. MacRae, W. L. DeKasset and Alexander Sprunt. Cutting a Funeral Procession in Two. We are requested to call the attention of the management of the street railway to the fact that as a colored funeral procession was on its way yesterday to Pine Forest Cemetery, and while crossing the street car track, a car coming up was driven through the procession, cutting it asunder, and nearly crushing a person who was in the procession. We presume it is only necessary to mention this fact to assure such measures by the management as will prevent a recurrence in the future, especially as we know that strict orders are given that in such instances the car must always wait until the procession has passed.

Sudden Death.

Philip Guion, a colored man about 25 or 30 years of age, died this morning in the county jail at 7 o'clock, of disease of the heart. Deceased was imprisoned on December 24th for assault and battery. The poor creature was taken ill last night about midnight, according to the evidence before the Jury of Inquest, and it was not until 6 o'clock this morning that his condition was known when the City Physician, Dr. Wright, was immediately dispatched for, but before the Doctor could render him any aid and about the time that the physician reached the jail, the poor unfortunate wretch had breathed his last. A jury was empanelled and an inquest held this morning by Coroner Hewlett. There was a post mortem examination also made by Dr. Wright, and a verdict rendered in accordance with the above mentioned facts.

Trouble Ahead.

A Mr. Reed, a lawyer from Philadelphia, was in Smithville a few days since, when he recorded a deed from a party in Philadelphia to him for 40,000 acres of land. The original deed on which the title is based is dated in 1798, and Mr. Reed is the third owner. It covers a large portion of the lands now occupied by Hon. Dan'l. L. Russell, Mr. George Swain and nearly a hundred other parties. Mr. Reed has also, we understand, deeds for 30,000 acres in Columbus county, and 40,000 in Craven county, on all of which suit is to be entered at once. Among the surmises as to what will become of the last man, it is queer that nobody has yet discovered that he is destined to be hanged to death by the last woman. Fresh pork sells here now for 8 cents a pound. Some very fine dressed geese were selling in market this morning at \$1.50 a pair. Jacob Wise, an old colored man and a citizen of Wilmington for many years, died this morning after an illness of only a few days. A colored woman living in Thompson's alley on the other side of the Rail Road, smothered her little child last night while asleep. Coroner Hewlett held an inquest this morning. NOTICE.

Schedule B Tax. ALL WHOLESALE AND RETAIL MERCHANTS are hereby notified that a Privilege Tax was levied, by the last Legislature, of Five Dollars (the same levied by county), in addition to the Schedule Tax proper. Wholesale Dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits, turpentine, rosin, and naval stores of any kind, and cotton; also wood and coal dealers.) All Hotels, Boarding Houses, Restaurants and Eating Houses are required by law to pay a tax of One Half Per Cent. on gross receipts. The tax will be due January 1st, and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of July, 1877.
