the agony of grief and passion depicted,
and throughout this scene and on to the
close of the piece the feeling portrayed
transcends description, so realistic was the
effect produced."

The combined effects of the freshet now

morning.
The water was very high and several
localities on the city side of the river were
flooded. At one time Messrs. Alex.
Sprunt & Son's office building was en-
tirely surrounded, the wharf in front of
the Review office was nearly covered,
the wharves were in the street and wash-
ing over the caps at the side of the dock
foot of Market, and they were encroach-
ing on the wharf of the Baltimore &
Wilmington S. S. Line. On Eagle's
Island the causeway was covered and
boats were paddled about on it, and
Messrs. Williams & Murchison's wharf
on the Island was flooded and some salt
stored there was slightly injured. It was
one of the biggest floods ever known
hereabouts.
