The Funeral of Ernest Knight. The Whiting Rifles, Capt. Jno. W. Gordon commanding, with muffled drum and colors draped in mourning, paid their last sad tribute to the remains of their departed comrade, Mr. Ernest Knight this morning, by escorting the body to Oakdale Cemetery and there firing a salute of three rounds of blank cartridge over the newly made grave.

Saturday's Accident. The distressing accident which occurred at the Railroad Shops on last Saturday afternoon, a hurried report of which was inserted in the Review at a late hour, and by which young Ernest Knight, a lad of about 16 years of age, was terribly injured, resulted in the death of the sufferer about 11 o'clock on Saturday night, seven hours after the accident occurred, all of which were full of the most intense anguish for the unfortunate lad. It was one of the saddest things that has ever occurred in our city and the afflicted family of the lad have the sympathy of the entire community in their terrible bereavement.

Death of Capt. HIGGS. Capt. Geo. A. Higgs, who will be recollected by many of our readers as Commanding the Scotland Neck Cavalry, who were stationed for several months at Wrightsville Sound during the earlier days of the war, died on Saturday evening in Raleigh and was buried yesterday afternoon from the Church of the Good Shepherd in that city.

The New Bridge. The Raleigh News learns that the massive stone piers for the new iron bridge of the Seaboard & Roanoke Railroad at Weldon are being rapidly hurried to completion, and unless again retarded by high water and bad weather, the magnificent iron structure will span the Roanoke by the first or middle of February, after which no further trouble will be experienced by high water, as the new bridge will be eighteen feet higher than the old one.

County Commissioners. The regular monthly meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was held to-day.

Report of Elijah Hewlett, County Treasurer, for the month of December was received and referred to Finance Committee.

Report of Committee on Out-Door-Poor, for December, was received and ordered spread on the minutes.

County claims of Solicitor Moore were referred to the Auditing Committee.

Ordered, that so much of the report of the Grand Jury for December term of Criminal Court as refers to the Poor House and the quarters for the insane there be referred to the Committee on Poor House with power to act.

Application of W. T. Gentry, to be relieved from poll tax he having paid the same in Virginia, was granted.

Report of John D. Taylor, Clerk of Superior Court and Judge of Probate, stating that he had affixed the seal of his office 215 times to such papers as the tax is required on from July 17, 1877, to January 1, 1878, was ordered spread on the records of official reports.

Application of Dr. W. E. Freeman, guardian of J. B. Pigford, for a reduction of taxes, listed under a misapprehension, was ordered laid on the table, all tax matters having been closed, and the same disposition was made of a similar application for Amanda Quinlin.

Application of Col. John D. Taylor, Clerk of Superior Court, for a small iron safe in which to keep the records of his office, was referred to Commissioner Worth, with power to act.

Joseph Salinan, a wounded ex-soldier, was ordered relieved of the payment of poll tax.

Resignation of Henry G. Davis, as overseer of the Federal Point road, was granted, and W. H. Williams was appointed to the position.

J. M. Moody and P. H. Von Kampen, were granted renewal license for the retail of spiritous liquors.

Sheriff Manning was also present and made a settlement with the Board for State taxes for the year 1877, amounting to \$20,140.43, net.

Nine Coupons, value \$15 each, (gold), and amounting to \$145, (gold) which were redeemed, last September, were burned in the presence of the Board.

Headquarters Second Military Dist. N. C. S. G. General Orders No. 1.

IN OBEDIENCE TO GENERAL ORDERS from the Adjutant General of the State, concerning the commissioned officers of the Second Regiment N. C. S. G. at Wadesboro on the 10th instant, for the election of a Colonel, Lieut-Colonel and Major, the said commissioned officers are hereby ordered to appear in full dress uniform at that time and at all subsequent elections for field officers.

NOTICE. Schedule B Tax. ALL WHOLESALE AND RETAIL MERCHANTS are hereby notified that a Privilege Tax was levied, by the last Legislature, of Five Dollars (the same levied by county), in addition to the Schedule Taxes proper.

Wholesale Dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits turpentine, rosin, and naval stores of any kind, and cotton, also wood and coal dealers.) All Hotels, Boarding Houses, Restaurants and Eating Houses are required by law to pay a tax of One Half Per Cent. on gross receipts.

The Tax will be due January 1st, and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of July, 1877. All parties interested in the payment of Schedule B Taxes will save costs by attending to the same at once, as the law will be strictly enforced. J. E. SAMPSON, Reg. of Deeds.
