 Sirs: Replying to your inquiry of to-day
 as to the privileges of stopping en route
 on limited tickets, I beg to say that con-
 necting roads selling such tickets over our
 lines now allow thereon reasonable periods
 of validity, and we are always ready upon
 a representation of the facts and desires of
 the original purchaser, to extend said lim-
 itations to a reasonable degree, in order
 that said parties may stop at different
 points along our lines, in case that the
 period of time expressed on their tickets
 has lapsed. For a protection of our inter-
 ests we expect such requests to be made
 in each case, in order that we may judge
 of its merits, and that said tickets have
 not passed into the hands of second or

St. Paul's Organ.
 The beautiful new organ, lately pur-
 chased for St. Paul's (Episcopal) Church
 by the generous contributions of its mem-
 bers and others who have always taken a
 friendly interest in its prosperity, was
 tested in the presence of a large and ap-
 preciative audience gathered within the
 church this morning. The organ is from
 the celebrated manufactory of Messrs.
 Geo. Jardine & Sons, of New York, who
 have a reputation for manufacturing some
 of the finest instruments made in the
 United States. The need of a new organ
 has long been felt by the worshippers of
 St. Paul's, and the active interest of a
 few of the lady members of the church in
 procuring one will be kindly remembered
 by every member.
 The purchase was made through Mr.
 Philip Heinslerger of this city. Mr.
 Schultetus, the representative of the
 makers superintended the erection of the
 organ in the Church, and to-day, on com-
 pletion, a delighted audience listened to
 selections from the great compositions of
 Handel, Meyerbeer, Mozart, Strauss and
 Meyerhoff under his hands.
 St. Paul's was established as a free
 Church by Bishop Atkinson in the year
 1867 to meet a want long felt in this

 With the addition of this new instru-
 ment, beautiful in finish and grand in

Janushek.
 The theatrical world of Wilmington
 will not forget that Janushek appears
 next Friday evening as "Catherine of Rus-
 sia," a cast in which she has no equal on

 tender love is a trying one in the extreme,
 but Janushek's conception and develop-
 ment of the character was perfect in its
 every phase and added new lustre to her
 already brilliant reputation. We do not
 think that we exaggerate when we say
 that, there is no woman on the stage to-
 day who can at all compare with her in
 tragic power, intensity of expression and
 personal magnetism.

Wilmington and Norfolk.
 On the last day of the old year, the 31st
 ult., we published the port statistics re-
 lating to exports for the month of De-
 cember and since then we have found in
 the Norfolk *Virginian* the same statistics
 for that port. As the comparison is de-
 cidedly in favor of Wilmington we ask no
 apology from the Norfolkians for mak-
 ing it here.
 From Norfolk during the month there
 cleared foreign 7 schooners, 4 barques, 2
 ships and 3 steamships, a total of 16 ves-
 sels which carried cargoes aggregating a
 value of \$1,300,709.91, and from Wil-
 mington there cleared 4 schooners, 7
 brigs and 84 barques, a total of 45 vessels,
 with cargoes amounting in value to
 \$1,401,527, leaving a balance in favor of
 this port of \$100,817.00.
