Snow, Esq., elected Secretary. Judge McKoy stated very impressively the object of the meeting, and then delivered a very appropriate eulogy upon the deceased, which we regret to say, want of space prevents our reporting here.

CAROLINA.

Raleigh News: Miss Julia Peace, one of our oldest citizens, died on yesterday morning at 6 o'clock, at her residence in this city. Her funeral will take place from the First Presbyterian Church this afternoon at 3:30.

Southern Home: J. R. Holland, Cashier of the Merchant's and Farmers' Bank, took a dose of chloroform for bromide of potash. He discovered his mistake immediately, and went to the drug store of Dr. McAden. Dr. Jones being present applied the necessary restoratives, and in a short time was out of danger. It was a narrow escape.

Southern Home: Gen. W. C. Means, of Cabarrus county, while crossing a swollen stream in his buggy, between this city and his home, had a narrow escape from drowning. His horse became frightened at some drift-wood, and threw the General out, and with difficulty he reached the bank. His horse was drowned.

Charlotte Observer: Mr. John G. Steele, the young man from Rock Hill, who had his knee-cap broken in the Fishing Creek disaster on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, has not yet recovered. On Sunday he was removed from his home to Columbia to be placed under the treatment of Dr. Tally of that city, at the expense of the railroad. It is stated that he has already taken steps to sue the road for \$10,000 damages.

Charlotte Observer: The mortal remains of Hon. Richmond M. Pearson, who died last Saturday night at Winston, were conveyed for burial to Statesville, near which place his daughter, Mrs. E. Hayne Davis resides, arriving there yesterday on the 12:15 train from Salisbury. They were accompanied by Mrs. Pearson, and by several other members of the family and a number of friends, and among others by two or three members of the Supreme Court bench. Mrs. Gov. Vance and Mrs. Judge Bynum, of this city, went up on yesterday morning's train from here, to be present at the funeral. The funeral services will take place to-day and will be conducted by Rev. E. W. Joyner, of the Episcopal Church.

Raleigh Observer: Christmas lingers in New-Light Township. Sunday evening a rovy took place in that heretofore peaceful and quiet township between a party of about six, in which Horace Chappel and a man by the name of Lappoon were the principals. We are unable to obtain full particulars of the cause of the row, and only learned that Chappel had his throat cut, the asophagus being almost severed. Lappoon was shot three times, each ball taking effect in his body. The cause of Chappel is reported as fatal, and Lappoon very critical. Chappel, it will be remembered, was the leading Radical of that Township, who on one occasion in opposing Tim Lee's nomination for Sheriff in a county convention and was overawled, "spoke out in meeting" and said to his victors, the day will come when I can say to you, "shake not they gory looks at me, thou canst not say I did it."
