Literary News.

The Bridge at Weldon.
Telegraphic dispatches received last evening state that the railroad bridge at Weldon is again threatened but upon inquiry at railroad headquarters here we learn that it is not considered as seriously endangered. The river has risen very considerably but it is thought that it has reached its highest and that the freshet will begin to run off to-night or to-morrow morning.
It is a fact, however, that several bridges on the Richmond & Danville R. R. have been again broken up by the floods, and from the report had here we presume that travel and traffic on that line has been seriously impeded.

For the Ladies.
Ladies who make for themselves the pretty little ornaments of ribbon and lace that brighten up the simplest toilet are now having throat bows of the double-faced satin ribbons. The fancy now is for narrow inch-wide ribbons of two or three colors and for long ends hanging from the throat to the waist; these come in elaborate fashions imported by the modists, but a simpler way is to buy a yard and a half or two yards of satin ribbon, black on one side and cardinal red on the other, and fasten it with the slender brooch or lace pin now worn—in two long loops and two hanging ends. Cravats that go around the neck are little used, now that dresses are provided with high English collars of the dress material that are too pretty to be hidden.
A Trim Little Craft.
The steam yacht *Tourist*, owned by Mr. Chas. H. Chesebrough, of New York, and commanded by Capt. J. S. Simmons as sailing master, arrived here from Beaufort this morning. The *Tourist* is as trim and perfect a little specimen of a vessel, as regards beauty, as the eye would care to rest on. She is a sidewheel steamer, 89 tons register, 103 feet keel, 22 feet, 6 inches breadth of beam, and draws only 3 feet, 8 inches.
Her engine is 22x60 and her rate of speed 12 to 14 knots an hour. She has two masts and can make sail and steam at the same time. The owner of the yacht, accompanied by his family, is taking a pleasure cruise to Jacksonville, Fla., and will probably spend several days in this port.

Transfer of Sleeping Car Trucks.
By invitation of Col. A. Pope, General Passenger Agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, we were present this morning and witnessed the transfer of one of the through Pullman Palace Sleepers that run between Boston and Savannah, from a track of 4-8 1/2 to one 5 feet in width. The method is simple enough when once understood, and can be accomplished in a few minutes, even while the transfer of baggage is taking place and the passengers are getting breakfast, so that no time whatever is lost. Immediately upon the arrival of the train the sleeper is backed up to the transfer bed, which consists of an inclined plane for the space of twenty yards and then at a depth of twenty-two inches runs on a perfectly level plane for thirty-five yards or 108 feet, which is about the length of the car. The track on which the sleeping car is pushed by the engine is made of cast iron and is capable of holding two trucks of different width at the same time. The bars of iron are almost in the shape of the letter U, the outer edges of which are for the wide gauge wheels and the inner edge for the narrow gauge. On the outer edges of the transfer bed and on a plane with the regular track, are two little narrow gauge tracks 18 inches in width, upon which are placed four pony trucks, two at each end of the car. As soon as the sleeping car is backed up into position two steel bars are run under the body of the car at each end. The bars of steel then become the supporters of the sleeper, while the pony trucks are grooved out so that the steel bars fit in and rest on these trucks. The sleeper is then pushed by the engine, which moves the pony trucks at the same time on a parallel line with the regular track, while the regular trucks now on the U track are moved down the inclined plane to the transfer bed, during which time the bolt that connects the body of the sleeper to the regular truck draws gradually out until by the time the trucks reach the level or bottom of the transfer bed they are completely disengaged from the sleeper; a long chain is then affixed to the trucks and they are drawn out while the sleeper is kept stationary. As soon as the 4-8 1/2 trucks are moved out of the way, the five feet trucks are then run under the sleeper and fastened in position by means of a chain to the draw bar of the car; the engine then, by the use of a long coupling, fastens on to the sleeper and pulls it out slowly, the trucks underneath running at the same pace, and when ascending the inclined plane the bolts from the sleeping car gradually drop into position on the truck. The pony trucks of course are made to move parallel with the other trucks by means of the connection with the body of the sleeper as mentioned above. As soon as the bolt from the sleeper is firmly fixed in the new gauge truck, the steel bars are removed from the support of the body of the car and the sleeping car is ready to be connected with the balance of the train and start on its journey southward. The same operation is performed in coming from the South and going North, and the whole time occupied both ways is but a few minutes, and it can be accomplished in much less time than it takes to either write or tell about it.
The time consumed this morning was about fifteen minutes, but this will be reduced to five minutes, we understand, in the future. The double U shaped track is an idea of Capt. Divines, the General Superintendent of the W. C. & A. and W. & W. Railroads. The transfer bed, we are informed, was originated by Capt. Ramsey, a Canadian, who has a patent for the same.

The Second Regiment.
In compliance with General Orders No. 19, issued from the Adjutant-General's office, the commissioned officers of the Second Regiment assembled in convention at Wadesboro, N. C., on the 10th day of January, 1878, for the purpose of electing field officers of said Regiment. All of the companies were represented either in person or by proxy. Lieut. C. W. Alexander of Company F, and Capt. A. H. Worth of Company A, were put in nomination for Colonel. Lieut. Alexander, having received the largest number of votes cast, was declared duly elected Colonel. Nominations for Lieut-Colonel was the next thing in order.
Captain Walter Coney, of Company C, and Captain John W. Gordon, of Co. D., were nominated for this position. Captain Gordon having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected Lieutenant Colonel. On motion to go into an election for Major, Captain W. A. Liles, of Company K., and Captain J. G. Branch, of Company G., were put in nomination. Captain Branch having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected Major. On motion the above elections were made unanimous. There being no further business the convention adjourned.

Janauschek.

Truly regal in her fearlessness, and terrible in her displeasure, yet withal so tenderly woman in her love, this imperial amazon can secure no fitting representation from less than a queen of the profession.
To say that Madame Janauschek deserves the position awarded her by the critics of the world is only a calm admission of simple justice. Her equal is difficult to find. She is truly a remarkable woman, which fact finds not the least significant exemplification in the wonderful mastery with which she made, comparatively late in life, of our most difficult language.
The support we consider very fair and nearly all of the actors were fully up to their parts.
To-night is the great artist's last performance here, when she will appear as *Lady Macbeth*. Of course there will be another crowded house.
