THE FINANCIAL TROUBLES. The way they are failing now in New is a cartion to outsiders. The oble which was pricked in 1873 is just now bursting, and our loyal brethren of the North are dropping out of ranks pretty fast. The situation is becoming alarming and no one knows when the end will be, or how far the puble will spread. It is rather early to expect the tide to flow down South, and there is no knowing that it will come here at all, but there are those who fear that its effects will be felt in the Spring. Still, it is an undeniable fact that the people of the South, who have since the war been bound hand and foot in the meshes of the capitalists in the North, are freer this year than they have been since '73,' and there are not wanting those among us who declare that the great waves of genuine distress will not reach us, but that the most our people will feel will be the agitation of the financial water the result of a commotion too far off to sfleet as seriously.

LAND GRANTS.

Major Eggelbard, Secretary of State, issued on yesterday sixty land- grants, of 28,000 sores of bubble lands in Me-Dewell county, to Northern parties. From this it would seem that one waste places are soon to be filled up -- Raieigh Observer.

ENGLISH FREEMASONRY.

The Earl of Carnaryon, the Pro-Grand Master of the English Freems - time. sons, a few days ago, at a very large meeting of Grand Lodge members, who represent the 1,700 ledges "working" under the English constitution, called attention to the recent action of the Grand Orient of France, who had struck out from their preliminary declaration words expressing belief in the existence of God and in the immuch debate upon this point in France itself, and seventy-six lodges had protested against the chanage. The Irish Grand Ledge had not hesitated to pass a resolution, uncompromisingly drawn, regretting the act of the French Orient, and dealing with it. In ording ary cases the Grand Lodge would have no right to interfere; but this was a matter which called for notice, as the French Grand Orient could not effect these changes without affecting the whole Masonic body throughout the world. The limits of Freemasonry were very wide, and included Roman Catholies, Prétestants-Church of England and Dissentersthe Mussulmans, the Calvinists, Lutherans and Jews, and the whole were bound together with the principles of religion, and there could be no such principles without a belief in God. The Prince of Wales was unanimously renominated Grand Master for the ensuing year.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12, 1878 In the House yesterday, the Invesgation Resolution, known as the Glover Resolution, was adopted by a vote of 111 to 107. This resolution gives to various committees authority to investigate various Bureaus of the government, with power to send for persons and papers.
