THE FINANCIAL TROUBLES.

The way they are falling now in New York is a caution to outsiders. The trouble which was pricked in 1873 is just now bursting, and our loyal brethren of the North are dropping out of ranks pretty fast.

LAND GRANTS.

Major Eggebard, Secretary of State, issued on yesterday sixty land-grants, of 25,000 acres of public lands in McDowell county, to Northern parties.

Not so fast! Men who enter land for speculation, calculating upon its future value to yield them a handsome return, and not those who intend to settle themselves or others upon them, are probably the parties who got these 25,000 acres.

ENGLISH FREEMASONRY.

The Earl of Carnarvon, the Grand Master of the English Freemasons, a few days ago, at a very large meeting of Grand Lodge members, who represent the 1,700 lodges "working" under the English constitution, called attention to the recent action of the Grand Orient of France, who had struck out from their preliminary declaration words expressing belief in the existence of God and in the immortality of the soul.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12, 1878. In the House yesterday, the Investigation Resolution, known as the Glover Resolution, was adopted by a vote of 111 to 107.

The Senate was not in session yesterday, and on the previous day nothing of importance was done except that Mr. Conkling introduced resolutions of inquiry as to the restoration of Privileges and Elections, and have another audience to-day. Their Con-

vention here has been a success in numbers and intelligence, but the general feeling among the delegates is that neither the House nor Senate has shown the expected interest in the movement.

Several intelligent gentlemen of this city are responsible for a new party, to be known as the "National Union Party," the plans and purposes of which are set forth in circulars being now extensively distributed. Of course the party was dead before it was born, but it is profitable to the Postoffice to have the birth so extensively announced.

The proposed resolution of inquiry into charges made by Wm. E. Chandler as to the means by which Hayes was seated has not been presented in either House. It seems to be felt by all that such a proceeding would be hardly up to the dignity of the questions involved in the Presidential case.

Prof. F. V. Hayden made an extended tour of exploration in the western Territory during the past Spring and Summer season, and returned to this city, the headquarters of the Survey, late in the Fall laden with results of a most interesting and important character.

The entire system of entry of the public lands in this State—what little there is left of them—is an erroneous one, and suggestive of legislative amendment. The public lands in this State should be sold only to actual settlers, and in this way only will our waste places be speedily filled up.
