### Petition for a New Postal Route.

We have now before us a petition from a large number of the substantial citizens of Black River and the lower part of Samson county, from Still Bluff to Lisbon, praying for the establishment of a semi-weekly postal route, via steamer to Still Bluff and Point Caswell, and thence over land to Beatty's Bridge, Black River Chapel, Harrell's Store, Herringville and Lisbon. The petition is accompanied by a carefully drawn map of the proposed new route, the present route from Rocky Point, and the country through which they both pass, which is the work of Henry A. Colvin, Esq.

We hope and believe that the prayer of the petitioners will be granted, as the necessity is an urgent one. As it is now, the route from Rocky Point, which must pass Long Creek and Moore's Creek to get to Point Caswell, is beset with difficulties. Both of the above streams are easily affected by heavy rains and are sometimes utterly impassable, and as a consequence the people at the offices above Moore's Creek are sometimes without their mail matter for two and three weeks at a time. The proposed new route is always passable, there being always, even in the driest seasons, water enough for the "stamboni" to run to Point Caswell, and above that point, on the land route, there are no water courses sufficiently large to obstruct travel, even in very wet seasons.

The Black River section seems to be peculiarly destitute of mail facilities. In one neighborhood, that lying south of the Bladen county line and between the Cape Fear and Black Rivers, a section of country 7 miles wide and 13 miles long, there is no postoffice, although the lands there are rich and the people prosperous. If the department would open this proposed new route and would establish postoffices at Still Bluff and Beatty's Bridge, they would meet the requirements of the case very nicely.

In granting this petition and in opening the new route there would be no interference with the postal rights or facilities of the good people of Lillington or Moore's Creek. The former could be supplied, as now, from Rocky Point, and the latter from Point Caswell on the new route.

The petition and map are to be forwarded at once to Washington City, accompanied by an earnest letter from Rev. Colin Shaw, to Hon. A. M. Waddell, the Representative from this District, and an early and favorable action is earnestly hoped for.

### Appleton's Journal

for February, in pursuance of the announcement of an illustrated series of articles describing "The American at Work," has a paper on salt-making at Syracuse, accompanied with suitable engravings, the text of which is by W. H. Rideing, and the drawings by Kelly. Among the articles in the number likely to attract attention, is one on "Rip Van Winkle," which is not a criticism on the character of the play, but an embodiment of a number of interviews with Mr. Jefferson, by which we have the actor's own ideas of his performance, of the character of the play, and of the people that gather to listen to him; and in addition to this there are some "behind-the-curtain" views of Jefferson in his private life and his social personality. Dr. Guernsey has made a connected narrative of Stanley's recent remarkable voyage down the Congo. George M. Towle writes interestingly of Dr. Schliemann's discoveries at Mycenae. Maurice Thompson has an entertaining paper in which the pugnacious spirit of birds is described and exemplified by numerous examples. Professor Harrison, of the Washington and Lee University, gives a description of a voyage from Athens to Corfu. There is a short story by Mrs. Lillian Browne; a pathetic poem by Edgar Fawcett; and other good things. "Cherry Ripe" is concluded; and "By Celia's Arbor" gives fresh evidence of being one of the best novels of the season. The editor discusses Human Interest in Landscape Art; the latest experiments as to the influence of plants upon the atmosphere; Whittier's birthday; the quarrels of statesmen; the function of criticism, &c.

### Oakdale Cemetery

The annual meeting of the lot owners of Oakdale Cemetery was held last evening.

The meeting was organized with Mr. W. M. Poissou as Chairman and Mr. R. J. Jones as Secretary.

The following gentlemen were elected a Board of Directors for the ensuing year: Directors—James H. Chadborn, W. President—Donald MacRae.

A. Wright, Edward Kidder, Wm. J. Yopp, Norwood Giles, Geo. R. French.

From the report of Mr. R. J. Jones, Secretary and Treasurer of the Company we make the following extracts:

MORTUARY. During the year there has been issued from this office 109 permits for interments in Oakdale.

Ages—Not stated, 7; under one year old, 13; over one and under ten, 37; over ten and under twenty, 6; over twenty and under thirty, 13; over thirty and under forty, 4; over forty and under fifty, 11; over fifty and under sixty, 8; over sixty and under seventy, 4; over seventy and under eighty, 6; total, 109. Of the above, 8 died in other places and were brought to Oakdale for interment; to wit: One from Whiteville; one from Baltimore, Md.; three from Florence, S. C.; one from Goldsboro; one from Clinton, and one from Norfolk, Va.

Diseases as Stated—Apoplexy 3, alcoholism 1, anasarca 1, Bright's disease 1, bronchitis 1, cancer 1, consumption 9, congestion 1, congestive chill 1, cholera infantum 7, chronic diarrhoea 1, congestive malarial fever 4, congestion of the brain 1, cystitis and hepatitis 1, coletis 1, dropsy 3, diphtheria 19, dysentery 3, diabetes 1, enteritis 1, gastro enteritis 1, gastric fever 1, heart disease 3, hemorrhage of the bowels 1, inflammation of the bowels 3, intermittent fever 2, jaundice 2, liver disease 3, lung disease 2, meningitis 3, marasmus 1, malarial fever 2, pneumonia 2, premature births and still born 5, typhoid fever 1, typhoid pneumonia 2, and not stated 13.

### VITAL STATISTICS

For several years past, in making my annual reports I have stated therein the causes of death, the age, and other circumstances relating thereto, for each "permit" issued feeling satisfied while doing so, that in many cases it was more guess work than otherwise. I am now glad to report, that some influence has awakened interest enough on the subject of "vital statistics" to develop a system, which, if it could but enlist the cooperation of the entire medical fraternity of the city, would furnish the information desired, and would be both reliable and valuable for reference.

Through the influence of the Superintendent of Health, Dr. A. E. Wright, the Board of Aldermen passed an ordinance, in May last, with a view of collecting such information. The certificates required by said ordinance were printed and distributed by Dr. Wright among the city physicians. Still, seven out of every ten who come for a "permit" have to be sent back for the required certificate, when, if the bereaved parties could only be informed that a certificate must accompany the application for the permit, the trouble to them, which is often very annoying, would cease.

I call attention to this subject now, with the hope that the rule governing this matter may become more fully understood, and to save annoyance of all parties when a permit has to be issued.

The following is the ordinance referred to: An Ordinance relating to the Health Department of the City of Wilmington.

Sec. 17. The several Cemetery Companies within the city shall monthly, on the first of each month, furnish to the Superintendent of Health certificates of the deaths of all persons dying within the city, showing the causes of death, age and date of death, under a penalty for neglect of ten dollars in each and every offence, and the Secretaries of said Cemetery Companies shall not allow any interment in their respective Cemeteries without a certificate from the physician who attended the case, and in case any person shall die in the city, unattended by any physician or surgeon, it shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Health to furnish such certificates before the interment can be made, under a penalty, for each and every offence, of ten dollars.

Sec. 20. This ordinance shall be in force from and after the first day of June, 1877.
