NOTICE. Schedule B Tax. ALL WHOLESALE AND RETAIL MERCHANTS are hereby notified that a Privilege Tax was levied, by the last Legislature, of Five Dollars (the same levied by county), in addition to the Schedule Taxes proper.

Wholesale Dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits turpentine, rosin, and naval stores of any kind, and cottons also wood and coal dealers.)

All Hotels, Boarding Houses, Restaurants and Eating Houses are required by law to pay a tax of One Half Per Cent. on gross receipts.

The Tax will be due January 1st, and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of July, 1877.

A Horrible Affair. We have just learned some of the particulars of a horrible accident which occurred near Lilliput, in Brunswick county, about 13 miles below this city, last Monday night, by which four men came to a fearful death. On Allen's Creek, near Lilliput, the four men were employed by Mr. A. G. Call in getting out timber. They camped at night in a rough shanty they had constructed, made from logs and brushwood, with earth heaped on top to keep out the winds and to give solidity to the structure. Not appearing at work yesterday the camp was visited and there a horrible sight was encountered. The hut had fallen in and been burned and the bodies of the four men, horribly disfigured by the fire, were found in the ruins. It is no known whether they were killed by the falling of the hut or were crushed by its timbers and thus, unable to extricate themselves, were burned to death, but the latter is feared. All of the bodies were badly disfigured by the fire, one man having had his legs burned off to the knees. The names of the unfortunate parties were D. Henry Tharp, white, aged about 23 years, George Devana, white, about 25 years old and Acana Badham and Dallas Williams, both colored, aged respectively about 20 and 25 years. An inquest was held yesterday when the bodies of the whites were identified, but the colored men were so burned and disfigured and crisped by the fire that recognition was utterly impossible and their identity was only established by the fact that they were known to have occupied the hut. The verdict of the jury was in accordance with the facts in so far as they are known, as described above. It is one of the most horrible affairs we have ever been called upon to chronicle.
