### The Sweet Singer of Erin.

There was a fine audience at the Opera House last night to welcome that truly musical marvel, M'le Rosa D'Erina, in one of her charming entertainments. She was introduced to the audience by Hon. Edward Cantwell in a few well chosen remarks.  
We must confess that we had some doubt of the ability of any one person, however talented, to maintain the interest of an entire evening in a concert entertainment, but this young lady soon put all such doubts to flight, and rarely have we enjoyed so delightful a musical treat.  
In appearance M'le D'Erina is very handsome, of fine physique and with a manner prepossessing and modest, yet with a graceful confidence, manifesting that she is perfectly at home in the world of music. Her voice is a clear mellow and powerful soprano of delightful sweetness and expression and of extraordinary power of endurance. But however great her vocal attainments they are fairly rivaled by her instrumental performances, which are truly magnificent both on the piano and organ. Throughout the entertainment she played her own accompaniments.  
Her selections were well chosen; opening with the "Ave Maria," she sang successively from the English, French, Italian and Spanish to which were added rare old Irish melodies, Scotch songs and American ballads. If we may select from so much excellence we would confess to our especial pleasure in the Spanish "Hunting Song" and "Kathleen Ma-vourneen," that gem of Irish music. Our Irish have just cause to be proud of their talented country woman.  
To-night M'le D'Erina will give a second and last entertainment, with entire change of programme.

## Mayor's Court.

Hester Swann and Mollie Waddell, arrested on Saturday last by officer Frost for disorderly conduct, were arraigned at 10 o'clock this morning on the double charge of creating a disturbance and resisting arrest. The testimony of officer Frost and officers Davis and Bender who assisted in making the arrest, went to prove that the woman, Hester Swann, used abusive and indecent language; and other witnesses testified that the woman, Hester Swann, struck officer Frost's child and abused his wife by calling her a liar, besides using very improper language which they the witnesses (being ladies) declined to repeat. All of this had occurred, say the witnesses for the prosecution, before officer Frost proceeded to make the arrest, as he was asleep in his house at the time the disturbance first commenced. Several witnesses for the prosecution corroborated officer Frost's testimony that when he placed his hand upon Hester Swann to arrest her that she seized hold of him violently and dragged him into the house, when Mollie Waddell, the other defendant, caught hold of the policeman at the same time, while a third colored woman, by the name of Maria Bland, ran in with an uplifted axe to strike the policeman; in the meantime Hester Swann had seized a stool to strike the officer with, which blow he warded off with his arm, and then turning to the woman with the axe disarmed her also. This done, officer Frost stepped to the door and blew his whistle for assistance, which was responded to by officers Davis and Bender, when the women were taken to the guard house.

The witnesses for the defendant swore diametrically opposite to what the witnesses for the prosecution testified to, and stated that the little daughter of Mr. Frost gave the first offence by applying a very ugly epithet to Hester Swann, and that when the woman Hester Swann complained to the child's mother, that she was called a liar, and told that if she was as white as cotton she would not be believed and when the mother of the child was told that the statement could be proven, that Hester Swann was again told that she was a liar and that her witnesses were liars too. One of the witnesses for the defence, Maria Bland, the same whom officer Frost swears ran in with an uplifted axe, swore that officer Frost leaped over her, (Maria Bland's) head while she sat on the door step to get at Hester Swann and seized the defendant by the throat and threw her down on the bed and choked her, and kicked her in the stomach and struck her in the breast. It is but fair, however, in the name of truth and justice to say right here, that this witness' testimony sworn to before His Honor, the Mayor this morning, differs essentially from the evidence she gave in before the colored Justices Court yesterday in regard to this same matter.

The officers at the City Hall say that the woman, Hester Swann, bore no marks of violence when she reached the City Hall under arrest.  
Officer Frost swore that he did not strike the woman at all, and did not lay hands on her in anyway except as an officer in attempting to make an arrest.  
Jno. L. Holmes, Esq. appeared for the defendants and argued his case well.  
The Mayor pronounced sentence at \$10 fine in each case the defendants to be committed until the fines are paid. At the solicitation of the defendants counsel the execution of the sentence was deferred until to-morrow to give counsel time to confer with his clients in regard to making an appeal.  
The Mayor then took the defendants own recognisance for their appearance to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock. The Court then adjourned.
