There is a slight freshet in the North-west Cape Fear now. The river began to rise at Fayetteville on Monday morning, and has probably reached its highest to-day. It is thought that five feet will cover the increase of water at that point. Annual Export Table.

C., to points out of the State, for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1877, and compared with the year 1876, 1875 and 1874. Also, the receipts of a few articles for the same period, with a note of the shipping for 1877. The table is complete, correct and comprehensive and evidences a long period of anxious care in its compilation. It should prove invaluable to the mercantile fraternity. It was printed by Mr. S. G. City Court.

The case of the two colored women, Hester Swann and Mollie Waddell, arraigned for disorderly conduct yesterday morning before His Honor the Mayor, and sentenced to pay a fine of ten dollars, which sentence was suspended at request of counsel for defendants until to-day, was called this morning at 10 o'clock. After some little argument and talk by the counsel for the defendants, who by the way seems to be earning his fee in this case, judgment was again suspended until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock owing to the fact that there seems to be some talk of compromising in the case before the Mayor, and that to come up before the next term of the Criminal Court between the same parties.

The women Hester Swann and Mollie Waddell were again released on their own recognizance to appear to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock. It seems to our understanding that the city authorities have shown a good degree of leniency in this matter, and have evinced a desire to be actuated in the settlement of this difficulty by none other than motives of justice. But we do begin to question very seriously whether it is becoming the dignity of the Court to make a further postponement of the case, waiting on the whims of the defendants. In fact it seems to us that it would be establishing a good precedent for the city authorities to refuse any compromise whatever, and let these disturbers of the peace understand that they propose to fight this matter out to the bitter end in justification of the conduct of their officials. It would save, we think, trouble in the future, and serve as a warning to all those who are inclined to do wrong.

Nearly A Fire.

Yesterday afternoon, about 2 o'clock, a house occupied by Mr. John Jones, an employe of the W. & W. R. R. Co., on Dickinson Hill, between Brunswick and Harnett streets, was found to be on fire. No general alarm was given, but those who were near at hand succeeded in getting water on the flames, and put out the fire. The origin of the fire is unknown. It was found between the weather-boarding and the ceiling and is thought to have probably been caused by rats and mice.

A Pretty Mantlepiece Ornament.

A pretty ornament may be obtained by suspending an acorn by a piece of thread tied around it, within half an inch of the surface of some water contained in a vase, tumbler, or saucer, and allowing it to remain undisturbed for several weeks. It will soon burst open, and small roots will seek the water; a straight and tapering stem as beautiful as those of the oak. The water should be changed once a month, taking care to supply water of the same warmth; bits of charcoal added to it will prevent the water from souring. If the little leaves turn yellow, put a grain of nitrate of ammonia in the utensil which holds the water, and it will renew their luxuriance.
