"Without a doubt Mary Anderson is destined to become a great actress. Young and necessarily inexperienced as she is, she possesses the qualifications which are sometimes recognized as histrionic genius, but more truthfully to be described as the inevitable consequences of a well-directed, carefully-trained artistic instinct, governed by a capable brain and great earnestness of purpose. The word intelligence does not adequately describe her facile expression nor her reading of the text. Both indicate originality and hard study. The word beautiful does not adequately convey her voice, face and form. Her voice is powerful, and powerfully stirs the emotions. Her face is both classic and mobile, and her form, though slight, is commanding. Miss Anderson's Evadne is a noble production.
