#### The Late Horror.

We publish on the fourth page of this issue some particulars of the horrible accident to that worthless hulk, the steamship Metropolis. The latest advices state that out of 260 passengers, 160 were drowned. The details are fearful. There is nothing left of the s eamer, except such fragments as are washed up on the beach, and dead bodies are strewn for miles along the sands. The vessel sprung aleak at sea and was beached, and "the treacherous coast of North Carolina" was the refuge this time for the one hundred souls that were saved. There is a fearful responsibility to be attached somewhere.

#### A Daring Deed.

One of the most gallant exploits of the war, even if its hero was a Yankee officer, was that performed by that daring sailor, Lieut. Cushing, when he entered the Cape Fear river, landed at Fort Johnson and actually invaded Gen. Hebert's headquarters and carried off one of his staff. As but a comparative few have ever heard the actual particulars of this affair, we republish here an article in the Philadelphia Times, written from Society Hill, S. C., and simply signed "Reader". It is worth attention. The

author says: Gushing's many exploits is yet to be told. I allude to the capture of General Louis Hebert's Inspector-General, Captain Kelly, right out of headquarters, within forty feet of a garrison of two hundred men and five pieces of heavy artillery, in the winter of 1864, at Smithville, near the mouth of Cape Fear River, North Carolina. The writer of this was Asst. Adjutant-General's Clerk, on the staff of General Hebert, commanding the defences at the mouth of the Cape Fear River, headquarters at Smithville, N. C., and had his sleeping apartments in the same building where the office was. The General's house was just across the street, in the rear of the office, and opposite the garrison quarters, where the troops quartered. The river was in front of all. Major Hardeman, who met Lieutenant Cushing on the beach below Caswell. Capt. Kelly's 'runk was sent to him, and Lieutenant Cushing expressed to Major Hardeman his sincere regret that General Hebert had been absent, and hoped when he next paid him a visit he would find him at home; he was somewhat consoled, however, in finding his Inspector-General, Capt. Kelly. Thus ended the most dating and partially successful exploit of Lieuten-

ant Cushing.
