Last Night's Performance.

Shakespeare's comedy "As You Like It," was presented last night by the Fifth Avenue Combination Company of New York, under the management of Mr. Augustin Daly. Miss Davenport as Rosalind, was charming, fascinating and interesting. The play itself, though it shows much wholesome thought, and contains many wise sayings, which render it so fascinating to the reader, is not one to win admiration when presented on the boards. This we think a great disadvantage to one of Miss Davenport's fine qualities as an actress, and is also a great mistake, if we may be permitted to venture an opinion per contra to this Queen of the Stage, in making such a selection. Miss Davenport is certainly entitled to the great reputation which she has achieved and enjoys and in our humble judgment she has not yet been surpassed, if equalled, by any appearance on this stage since the charming and accomplished Mrs. Gladstone delighted a Wilmington audience in ante-bellum days. Like all travelling stock companies the support to the principal characters was poor. Mr. Barrymore as Orlando conceived and acted his part well. Mr. Bainbridge as Adam was a success. Mr. Fisher as Jaques, was so rapid in his articulation that he could not be understood half the time. Mr. Bennett as Le Beau, in reciting the seven ages of man was not equal to Fleming, whom our citizens will recollect as one of Marchant's troupe before the war. Upon the whole we think if a better selected piece had been given, the audience would have been more delighted.

New French Method of Washing.

A new system of washing has lately been introduced in some French towns which is worthy of special mention. Its economy is so great as to reduce the cost to the following figures: Five centimes (1d.) for a pair of drawers; two and a half centimes (1/2d) for each shirt, and so on. This is the process: One kilo (two pounds) of soap is reduced with a little water to a sort of pap, which, having been slightly warmed, is cooled in forty-five liters (ten gallons) of water, to which is added one spoonful of turpentine oil and two spoonfuls of ammonia; then the mixture is agitated. The water is kept at a temperature which may be borne by the hand. In this solution the white clothes are put, and left there for two hours before washing them with soap, taking care in the meantime to cover the tub. The solution may be warmed again and used once more, but it will be necessary to add half a spoonful of turpentine and another spoonful of ammonia. Once washed with soap, the colors are put in warm water, and the blue is applied. This process, it is obvious, spares much time, much labor, and fuel, while it gives to the clothes a whiteness much superior to that obtained by any other method, and the destructive use of the wash-board or of pounding is not necessary to clean the clothes from the impurities which they contain.

River and Bar Improvements.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, held this morning at the Produce Exchange to receive the report of the Committee on River and Harbor Improvements, a resolution was passed requesting Mr. H. Nutt, Chairman of the above named Committee, to proceed to Washington City and urge upon our Representatives from this State the importance of an appropriation to continue the works begun by the government at the mouth of the river. Upon Mr. Nutt's stating that probably it would be impossible for him to leave home, the President, Hon. A. H. VanBokkelen, was authorized in such a contingency to appoint some other gentleman in Mr. Nutt's place, and Messrs. I. B. Grainger and R. E. Heide were requested to act as a committee for raising \$150 to defray the expenses of the delegate to Washington.

Gentle Annie.

The inimitable, irrepressible Annie Speight, sometimes known as Gentle Annie, who has been five times in jail, once in the penitentiary, and in the guard house more times than we can think to count right now, was yesterday arrested on a warrant from Justice H. E. Scott, of Brooklyn township, upon two serious charges—to-wit: obtaining money under false pretences and the larceny of certain articles. But Gentle Annie has not had all of her experience in the court house, jail, and penitentiary for nothing. She prepared herself for the contest, and today when the trial came off, she had fortified herself with so much testimony that the prosecutor was completely overwhelmed, vanquished, and Annie Speight, "to be shure and bless ye sowl" was acquitted.

A white man by the name of John Murray was arrested this morning upon a warrant issued by Justice E. D. Hall upon the charge of burglary. The trial is set for half-past four o'clock this afternoon.

Boston Tea Bread.

To one quart of flour add two teaspoonfuls DOOLEY'S YEAST POWDER, a little salt, butter the size of an egg, rubbed in the flour, one pint sweet milk, and the yolks of two eggs beaten very light. Add last, stirring in lightly, the whites of the eggs well beaten, and bake in a square pan in a quick oven. Break in squares for the table.

The Passport is well equipped and is said to be a very fast yacht. Mr. Geo. Myers has the matter in charge, and from him we learn that the Passport will be put on the line about the middle of the month.

Mr. H. V. Skipper, a young man who works at Mr. A. Johnson's cooper works on Eagle Island, called on us yesterday and exhibited to us a specimen of his work. The Freedman's Bank.

The commissioners of the Freedman's Saving and Trust Company have given notice that they have declared a dividend of ten per cent. in deference to the desire expressed by many of the depositors, the payments to commence March 20. The dividend would have been larger but for the difficulty of selling real estate belonging to the company. Of 134 pieces of property offered at foreclosure sale the commissioners have been compelled to buy in for the benefit of depositors 117 pieces, scarcely any other bids than their own having been made at these sales.

Report of Superintendent of Health.

From Dr. A. E. Wright, Superintendent of the Public Health for the city, we have the following report for the month of January:

MARRIAGES—Three white and 11 colored couples; total, 14. Births, 12 white and 13 colored; total, 25. Stillbirths, 1 white and 2 colored; total 3.

DEATHS—Whites, 8 male and 2 female; total, 10; of these only one was an infant, the balance adults; colored, 11 male and 9 female; of these 8 were infants, the balance adults. The causes of death were gun-shot wound, asthma, shock from injury in R. R. shop, dropsy, inflammation, cancer and consumption.

The Board of Aldermen, who were to have met in regular monthly session last evening, for the transaction of business, did meet at 7 o'clock, but agreed to postpone the transaction of any important business until this evening, and, thereupon adjourned without having the minutes of the preceding meeting read.
