VIEWES AND REVIEWS.

The National Printing Company, Chicago, has received an order from Liverpool, England, for 5,000 show bills.

The New York elevated railway carried during 1877 3,292,100 passengers, an increase of 1,023,200 over 1876.

Fresh flowers are daily placed around the tomb of Napoleon III, at Chiselhurst, by direction of his widow Eugenie.

The Democratic House of Representatives in Ohio has passed unanimously a bill to strike the word "white" from the militia laws of the State.

Montenegro, in the late Russo-Turkish strife, lost four thousand in killed and seven thousand in wounded, or more than a quarter of its population capable of bearing arms.

The California Legislature has passed a law making incendiary language a felony. This has been done to meet the cases of Communistic leaders who are trying to stir up an outbreak in San Francisco.

An English tourist who met Gen. Grant standing by the statue of the Sphinx in Egypt wrote home that he "never saw such a Sphinx-like man before."

The winter of 1877-78 surpassed the present one in mildness. Farmers ploughed every month of the season, and no snow fell until February 2. It was followed, however, by a cold, backward spring, with a snow storm in May which killed the returning swallows.

Sixty-five of the eighty-one lives lost at the Ashtabula disaster have been paid for by the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railroad Company at a rate averaging \$5,000 apiece.

The Crown Prince of Germany and his wife have not, considering their station, a very large annual income. It is only about \$75,000. They have, however, two residences, rent free, and the right to give a certain number of dinners every year, at the charge of the Emperor.

Mr. Corcoran, of Washington, one of the kindest of men, has just done a very generous thing. Students are permitted to copy the pictures in the Corcoran Art Gallery, and among them the old gentleman often saw a young woman doing excellent work.

Madrid journals now speak of an intention to remove Martinez Campos, the present captain-general of Cuba, whose arrival in the island was not long ago heralded as portending instant death to the rebellion.

The influence which the recent numerous failures of life insurance companies have had upon the public confidence, is shown by the fact that even so sound and popular an institution as the Mutual of New York City reports only 91,553 policies in force on January 1, 1878, against 92,125 in force January 1, 1877.

A Constantinople letter gives an interesting account of the disturbed condition of that city, the apprehensions of a revolution, and the new departure of the Turkish women. The participation of Turkish women in the care of wounded is one of the strange things that has come to pass in this war.
