#### Regulations For Lent.

The following are the regulations for the coming Lenten saason, in the Catholic Diocese of Richmond, and Vicariate of North Carolina, which commences Ash Wednesday, the 6th of March:

Every day of Lent (Sundays excepted) s a fast day, binding on all not legitimate-'y dispensed. Only one full meal (to be taken after midday) is allowed by law.

Flesh meat is allowed on Sundays at all the meals, and on work days-at the principal meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays-except the second and last Saturdays.

To those who fast, custom allows in the morning a cap of coffee, of tea, or chocolate, made with water, and a small portion of bread; also an evening collation not to exceed the fourth part of an ordinary meal. Those not having control of their times of repast, and who are forced to take their dinner at a late hour in the afternoon, are permitted to transfer the col-

lation to the morning. Flesh meat and fish are not to be used during Lent at the same meal.

Excluding flesh meats, if the proportion customary for a collation be not exceeded, it is permitted to use at collation the other articles of food, such as fruit, butter, cheese, eggs, or even fish.

The preparation of food with hog's lard

is allowed. Being under twenty-one years of age, old age, infirmity of health, pregnancy, the nursin g of infants at the breast, and hard labor, are good causes of dispensation from the fast. But good reasons for being exempted from the fast are not always reasons to be exempted from the abstinence.
