Postal Ruling.

Postmaster James, of New York, has issued the orde of the Postmaster-General providing that printed matter of every kind or description offered for mailing at thirdclass rate must be receiveed into the mails for transmission therein at the rate of one cent for each ounce, or two ounces, or fraction thereof as the case may be. This applies to printed directions, or requests or any printed matter upon the envelopes, as well as the inclosures therein.

Respecting price-marks upon samples of merchandise, they will not subject such samples to a higher rate of postage, provided such price-marks appear in the original print. This ruling is intended to repeal and overrule any rulings heretofore made inconsistent with the same.

The State Guard.

We understand that a meeting or convention of the commissioned officers of the North Carolina State Guard will be held some time in May, in Charlotte, for the purpose of discussing measures in which the organization are deeply interested. The call will be issued by Adjutant-General Jones who seems to know no rest in his efforts to promote the discipline and efficiency and welfare of the Guard. The most prominent subject for discussion will be a bill which it is proposed to introduce into the Legislative at its next session, laying a small tax upon all non-military citizens who are within the limits of the required age, in consideration of their exemption from duty, for the benefit of the various companies, thus making the militia service in this State an entirely volunteer one. 




