STILL TALKING.

A Russian Ultimatum.

Pushing Troops Toward the Gallipoli Peninsula.

Austria Waiting Events.

LONDON, April 2.—The Standard has the following from Constantinople: "The Russians are waiting for the Turks to make a move."

A despatch to the Vienna Political Correspondence from Constantinople reports that the Russians have commenced a fresh movement toward Gallipoli.

The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Vienna says: "A despatch from Count Von Buol, the Austrian Ambassador at London, received here, states that Lord Beaconsfield and Salisbury earnestly desire the maintenance of peace."

The latest advices from Constantinople say: "A strong conviction prevails at the Russian headquarters at San Stefano that an Anglo-Russian war is inevitable."

The Times, in its leading editorial article, says: "The government's conviction that the terms extracted from Turkey are inconsistent with the interests of England and Europe will be sustained by the public opinion of the country."

General Ignatieff has arrived in St. Petersburg. The Agence Russe maintains that his mission has not failed, as he was simply instructed to give and receive friendly explanations.

A correspondent of the Times at San Stefano recounts an interview with the Grand Duke Nicholas, who said he had reason to know that the Sultan would gladly see his territory freed of Russians and English.

It is announced that General Ignatieff will return to Vienna after he has consulted Prince Gortschakoff on Austria's objections to the treaty.

It is admitted at St. Petersburg that Austria is not at all disposed to state clearly the price of her neutrality, recognizing the fact that war between Russia and England would enable her to dictate her own terms.

The Times' St. Petersburg despatch, and advices from Berlin and Vienna, mention some indications that Russia might desire to renew the negotiations for a congress, taking the Treaty of Paris as a basis of discussion.

At Vienna hopes are still entertained that the Congress may meet. Nothing transpires about the feeling at Berlin. A special despatch to the Times from that capital says that Prince Bismarck is going to his Lauenburg estates shortly unless detained by the Eastern question.

The semi-official Eastern Budget prints the following despatch from Vienna: "General Ignatieff was informed by this government that it requires certain alterations to be made in the peace preliminaries, and such alterations must be made with the concurrence of the other Powers."

The Standard announces in official form that it has been decided to immediately recall the Duke of Edinburgh from the Mediterranean. It is probable that four ships of the Channel Squadron will go to the Piræus.

The Mexican Border.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The State Department reports that recently at Mier, on the Rio Grande, the Mexican authorities, on requisition made, returned a herd of stolen cattle to their Texan owners and took steps to punish the thieves.

An Irish Earl Assassinated. DUBLIN, April 2.—Intelligence has been received here that the Earl of Leitrim, his clerks, and also his driver were all shot dead this morning while driving near his Lordship's lodge, Manor Vaughan, county of Derry.

The Earl of Leitrim was shot opposite a cottage from which he had recently evicted a widow. Eighty-nine of his tenants were under notice to quit.

The Earl of Leitrim's body was found in a ditch. The left side of his head is battered in. It is thought he was also shot in the head, but the fatal shot was through the heart. The left arm is broken, and the right completely shattered.

London, April 2.—In the House of Commons, to-night, Mr. Lowther, Under Colonial Secretary, commented on the report of the shooting of the Earl of Leitrim, and said there was reason to suppose that the crime was one of an agrarian character.
