The Police Uniforms. We understand that the Committee on Police, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen and of Audit and Finance, have awarded the contract for police uniforms to Mr. A. David, his bid having been the lowest for the style adopted. The new uniforms are to be of the standard West Point Cadet grey cloth, instead of blue, as heretofore, with the coat double breasted.

Telephonic Communication. Wilmington is to have a telephone. The office of Capt. A. D. Cazaux, foot of Chestnut street, and those of the C. & R. W., on the third floor of the New Hanover Bank building, are to be connected. The connection is to be made on the telegraphic wires and the instruments are to arrive in a day or two.

The Market House. Work on the Market House has been finally completed and the improvement is a marked one. There are ten gas lamps in position, extending the entire length of the building. The color now is light blue and the suggestion of cleanliness presented to the eye is a comfortable one. The entire cost was in the neighborhood of \$200.

Revenue Note. The Treasury Department has issued a circular of regulations concerning internal revenue gaugers' fees and expenses. No gauger is allowed to accept any compensation other than that prescribed and paid by United States authority, nor permitted to become interested in any tobacco, cigar or liquor business.

Astronomical. The transit of Mercury, which is to occur the 6th of May, will be visible all over the United States, and seven hours and a half will be consumed in the passage. Astronomers are anticipating the event with great anxiety and interest, for it is hoped that it will throw light upon the question as to whether there is an interior planet to Mercury, and also determine the orbit of the latter definitely.

A Telephone Fire Alarm. "The Norfolk Virginian" says that the Bell Telephone Company of Boston, Mass., have made a proposition to inaugurate the telephone fire alarm system in Norfolk for the sum of \$900. The company agrees to furnish fifteen stations to be placed in such localities as are deemed most convenient. There may be something in this to commend itself to the attention of the authorities of this city.

Sol. Bear & Bros. Mr. Sol. Bear has returned from his regular Spring visit to the Northern markets, and the entire force in the establishment of Messrs. Bear & Bros., is now at work unpacking, ticketing and displaying the new goods. Mr. Bear bought largely and every floor in the two buildings is now full of goods. His purchases of clothing for the retail trade, were unusually large, and in this line the house can display one of the most extensive stocks in the State. The senior member of the firm will hereafter give his exclusive personal attention to the retail department.

Another Postal Item. The House Committee considering postal matters have agreed on their bill classifying mail matter. It makes some important changes in the interest of cheap rates on mail matter. Drop letters are continued at two cents, but the advantages for the public and newspaper publishers will be found in the rates on printed matter, which have been reduced to the system of two cents per pound on paper all around, instead of the old two cents and three cents, according to the quality of matter. It was also determined to provide that papers can be sent as samples by publishers at the regular rates. The bill will be reported at an early day.

Criminal Court. The following cases occupied the attention of the Court to-day. State vs. William Frost, Mollie Waddell and Hester Swann, for an affray. Motion by defendant Frost for a new trial.

State vs. William Cowan, David Waters and Henry Neill, for larceny. Jury withdrawn and mis-trial. Case continued. Henry Neill and David Waters to give justified bond in the sum of \$100 each, for personal appearance at next Court. William Cowan ordered discharged.

State vs. Samuel Robinson, for murder. Plea not guilty. Jury out. The jury in the case of Mary Eliza Lively, for assault and battery, returned a verdict last night of guilty.

The Murder Trial. The trial of Sam Robinson, colored, for the murder of Lewis Davis, also colored, which occurred in this city some weeks ago, a report of which was duly published by us at the time, has been in progress in the Criminal Court to-day before His Honor, Judge Meares.
