Sudden Death.

Mrs. Moore, the wife of Mr. John Moore, an employe at the gas works at the foot of Castle street, died very suddenly this morning, at her residence on Wescott's Alley, between Second and Third and Castle and Church streets. Her husband had gone to his work and about half past 5 o'clock Mrs. Moore arose and began to dress, but soon fell to the floor with a sudden illness. Rail Road Items.

We understand that Treasurer Thompson yesterday remitted to England the sum of about fifteen hundred pounds sterling, or its equivalent in foreign exchange, to pay the interest on the bonded debt of the W. & W. R. R. Company, due on the 1st day of May to English bond-holders, who hold bonds of the above named Company.

It seems to be the general opinion in well-informed circles that the lessees of this Company will not pay the dividend to the stock-holders, which is now over due nearly ninety days, but will surrender the lease into the hands of the stock-holders about the 15th of this month in compliance with the terms of the lease.

The Cuban Postal Trip.

The Postal Excursion seems to have been abandoned just at the point where it began to assume most interest. The party had got as far as Cedar Keys, Fla., where the railway lines terminated and where they were to have taken the steamer for Havana, and now we find in the Savannah News, of last Sunday's date, a special despatch which says that the loss of the steamship Agnes off Mosquito Inlet, Fla., will prevent the postal commission from going to Havana. They will return to Washington at once and should pass here to-morrow, at the latest, unless a change in the original programme is made to give something in the way of spice and novelty to the trip by returning them to Washington City by a different route than that by which they came.

Wilmington Cotton Mills.

The fourth annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington Cotton Mills was held this morning at the Bank of New Hanover, Mr. B. G. Worth was called to the chair and Mr. B. E. Calder requested to act as Secretary. The Treasurer of the company and the Secretary of the meeting were requested to verify proxies, and reported 571 shares represented in person and 600 shares represented by proxy making a total of 1171, which being a majority of the 1253 shares, the meeting proceeded to business. The President read his report for the past year and explained the financial condition of the corporation; after which a resolution was offered providing for the appointment of a trustee with full power to advertise and sell the property, stock and franchise of the corporation and with the proceeds to pay its debts.

After discussion a stock vote was called for, and the resolution was unanimously adopted. An election of officers was then held, which resulted in the choice of the following gentlemen:

Mrs. Studie McKoy Griggs.

As we briefly announced last week, this most estimable lady died at the residence of her husband, Dr. J. W. Griggs, in this city, on Wednesday night, March 27th, of capillary bronchitis. On Friday morning, at the hour of ten, her mortal remains were followed to their resting place in our city cemetery by a large number of sympathizing friends and citizens—a solemn funeral service being performed at the Baptist Church. A beautiful Christian life was fitly closed "quite on the verge of heaven." Her father-in-law, who was also her physician, perceiving that her end was near, endeavored to say something which should apprise her, as gently as it was possible, of her real condition, and directed her to Christ as the only Comforter in her extremity; but she anticipated a part of what he would say, by exclaiming: "And what a precious Savior He is!" To her mother she spoke of a vision of the great Supper of the Lamb, at which thousands and thousands were assembled, adding, "I must go to join them." Among her last words were these, so beautiful and expressive: "Lord, take me home, I am so sleepy." Her Lord was pleased to grant the prayer of His tired, worn child, for soon she "fell on sleep" as calmly as "sinks the gale when storms are o'er." Mrs. Griggs won the love of all who knew her by the manifestation of a truly Christian gentleness. Genuine were the tears shed over her brief—real and poignant the sorrow caused by her early death. The child of culture—high born and bred in a school of refinement—charming in conversation and faultless in manner—she was at home in the most polished company, while her Christ-like spirit and sincere courtesy condescended to the lowly and rendered her lovely in their eyes. Though we had been an acquaintance and a visitor at her home, so modest were her pretensions that we never ascertained until after her death that her father was a distinguished jurist and a presiding Judge of North Carolina.

From her thirtieth year a communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, her youthful days were consecrated to the service of God. To the rector of her parish she was a helper in every good word and work—leading the music of the sanctuary at the organ and otherwise lending her aid to the advancement of the cause of Christ. But she is gone! To the stricken young husband, the heart-broken parents, the sorrowing, only brother, we tender our Christian sympathy. And may the tender Shepherd carry in His bosom the lamb bereft of such a mother—West Point (Ga.) Press.
