His death will be regretted by his many friends here as well as by those who were the beneficiaries of his kind charity.

## The Late Jno. W. Hewlett.

The body of Mr. Jno. W. Hewlett arrived here this morning in charge of Messrs T. J. Smith and R. B. Hartsfield, and was carried direct to the Cemetery from the depot. At the time of the accident which caused Mr. Hewlett's death, his train was going about six miles an hour, and as the engine went into the culvert the tender followed crushing Mr. Hewlett and his fireman against the boiler head. He was instantly killed, his neck, arms and legs were broken by the tender. The bodies of Mr. Hewlett and his fireman, who was a former engineer, laid under the tender for twenty-six hours before they could be gotten out.

Mr. Hewlett's watch stopped the moment of his death, but the fireman's was running when he was taken from under the debris. Mr. Hewlett was highly respected and much thought of, by the officers of the road, and a few days before his untimely death he was given the position of Master Machinist of the shops of the Alabama & Chattanooga R. R., and was to have taken charge of them on the first of May.

Application for a renewal of liquor license to Delafare Towers was not granted on the ground that he kept a disorderly house which should be broken up. (The letter referred to Section 3rd, 76th and 29th of the Act to Regulate Elections ratified March 12th 1877. The act requires the Secretary of State to furnish the County Commissioners with Registration, Poll and Election books, also such printed blanks as may be necessary for County returns upon the requisition of the Commissioners.)

## Cutting Affray—One Man Seriously Hurt.

Saturday night, about 7 o'clock, a serious cutting affray occurred on Ninth, between Mulberry and Walnut streets, which may result in the death of one of the parties to the affray. There seems to have existed a feud between Alfred Benton and George Cole, both colored, for some time past, and recently Benton has been heard to say that it was his intention of killing Cole, and on Saturday evening essayed to put his threat into execution. From witnesses we learn that Benton made the attack upon Cole, drawing at the time something from his pocket which resembled a knife, whereupon Cole ran and was hotly pursued by his antagonist. Benton first struck Cole in the side with a knife and put in several other blows with his knife in quick succession. Cole, it seems also had a knife and inflicted one or two ugly gashes about Benton's face and head. The men were arrested and carried to the station House when the city physician and Dr. W. W. Lane were sent for to dress the wounds. The wound in Cole's side is considered dangerous but those in the back and hip are not of a nature to cause any alarm. Benton was turned over to Dr. Lane, the physician in charge of the hospital and is under guard. Cole was released under bond and is at his home where he receives the necessary medical attention.

This morning, Mayor Fishplate turned the case over to Justice Hall for a preliminary examination. Justice Hall will take an *ante-mortem* statement from Cole during the day to be used in the preliminary examination.

Each Ward and Township to elect seven delegates. The Township meetings will be held on Tuesday, 30th inst., at noon, at the usual polling places unless other places may be agreed upon by the voters and the Executive Committee man of the Township. Each Ward will elect also two Executive Committee men, and each Township one, which shall constitute the County Executive Committee, and the members of said Committee in the City of Wilmington the City Executive Committee, said Committees to hold office from the Convention 4th of May, until the next County Convention of the Democratic party. It is recommended that the Delegates in the Ward and Township meetings be elected by ballot; also the members of the Executive Committee.
