Strawberries cling devoutly to twenty-five cents per quart, flush time prices. Capt. R. M. It has fallen about fifteen feet in two days but there is no danger just now of not having good boating water. **Benton in Prison.** An officer was sent to the city hospital yesterday for Alfred Benton, one of the parties of the serious cutting affray which occurred on last Saturday night in this city, and conveyed the prisoner to the city prison, where he is now confined.

About the All-Absorbing Topic. Some of the Waddell men, last night, not content with keeping all of the voters in the different wards from going to sleep, had to wake every telegraph operator between here and Washington City, to let Col. Waddell know that the First, Second and Third Wards in Wilmington, had appointed Waddell men as delegates to the nominating convention of New Hanover, which meets in this city next Saturday, the 4th day of May. They finally succeeded, we understand, in arousing the Richmond operator, and he in turn promised to rouse Mr. Waddell at half-past six this morning, when the Northern bound train reaches there and hand him the telegram. The reason assigned for all this to-do is to be found in the fact that the Democratic vote in the county is 1,622, and the First, Second and Third Wards poll a majority of the Democratic vote of the county. The First Ward's Democratic strength, as recorded at the last election, is 234; the Second Ward, 331, and the Third Ward, 304, making a total of 869, which subtracted from the Democratic vote of the county leaves a majority in favor of the Wards above mentioned of 116 votes. There seemed to be the best sort of feeling between the friends of the two candidates for the nomination in this city, (Col. Waddell and Maj. Stedman), and no bitterness of feeling as regards them personally, so far as we can learn. A fact which we are very happy to record. But be it understood we only speak this, to the extent of our own personal observation.

Ward Meetings. Meetings were held in the different Wards of this city last evening for the purpose of electing delegates to the Democratic County Convention which convenes in this city on Saturday, May 4th. **FIRST WARD.** Capt. W. M. Parker called the meeting to order. It was moved to go into an election for a permanent Chairman. Capt. W. M. Parker and Mr. Jesse Ives were placed in nomination. Messrs. T. C. Lewis and W. D. Mahn were appointed Tellers. The meeting then proceeded to ballot, at the conclusion of which it was announced that 137 votes were cast, of which Capt. Parker received 47 and Mr. Ives 90. Mr. Ives was declared duly elected. Messrs. J. L. Dudley and W. D. Mahn, were appointed to conduct the Chairman to the chair. Mr. J. L. Dudley moved that Mr. W. H. Strauss be made Secretary by acclamation. On motion, the meeting then proceeded to elect delegates to the Democratic County Convention. Messrs. J. W. Strauss, L. L. Boon, T. A. Watson, W. H. Strauss, J. W. Gerds, W. M. Parker and D. Quinlivan being put in nomination as Stedman delegates, and Messrs. O. A. Wiggins, Jesse Ives, J. D. Mahn, J. M. Henderson, S. H. Morton, J. L. Dudley and C. M. Filyaw as Waddell delegates. At the conclusion of the balloting it was announced that the whole number of votes cast was 133, of which the Stedman delegates received 39 votes, and the Waddell delegates 94. It was moved to vote for members of the County Executive Committee *in vacuo*. Messrs. T. C. Lewis and Charles Schulken, and W. D. Mahn and W. J. Mott were placed in nomination, and Messrs. Mahn and Mott were declared elected. **SECOND WARD.** At a meeting of the Democratic voters of the Second Ward, held last evening, on motion, Mr. John C. James was called to the chair and Mr. T. C. DeRosset elected Secretary. The following gentlemen were chosen delegates to the county convention: W. L. Smith, Roger Moore, Dr. W. E. Freeman, G. J. Boney, N. Giles, J. C. Munds and A. T. London. The following gentlemen were elected members of the County Executive Committee: DuBrutz Cutlar and Wm Calder. The following resolution was adopted, with one dissenting voice: We, the Democratic voters of the Second Ward, in meeting here assembled, do resolve, that in the Hon. Alfred M. Waddell we have ever had a faithful, zealous and able Representative, and we do hereby instruct our delegates to the County Convention to vote first, last and always for him, and to use every effort to secure his re-nomination [and re-election. **THIRD WARD.** The Democratic voters of the Third Ward met and organized by calling R. J. Jones, Esq., to the chair, and electing Mr. J. W. King as Secretary. A ballot was then had for delegates to the Democratic County Convention, and the following Waddell delegates, were elected: R. J. Jones, R. S. Radcliffe, Wm. M. Hayes, James Sprunt, Morris Bear, J. W. Woolvin and John M. Robinson. Messrs. James W. Collins and Matthew J. Heyer were elected to represent the Third Ward in the Democratic County Executive Committee. In this ward 205 votes were cast, of which the Waddell delegates received 121 and the Stedman delegates 84. **FOURTH WARD.** The meeting of the Democrats of the Fourth Ward, was held in the City Court Room, C. H. Robinson, Esq., by consent, called the meeting to order and explained its object to be that of electing delegates to the County Convention. Mr. W. R. Kenan was then requested to act as Secretary. Nominations for permanent Chairman being in order, Messrs. T. H. McKoy and W. P. Oldham were presented. The Chairman appointed Messrs. O. G. Parsley and W. H. Bernard to act as Tellers. A ballot was had and Mr. T. H. McKoy was declared elected, he having received 97 votes and Mr. P. Oldham 91. It was moved and adopted that the seven delegates to the County Convention be balloted for and that a register of voters be kept. Mr. Kerchner nominated as Waddell

delegates Messrs. James Alderman, F. C. Singletary, D. G. Worth, N. B. Rankin, James Madden, John W. Dunham and W. A. Williams, Jr. Mr. John J. Fowler nominated the following as Stedman delegates: Messrs. J. W. Atkinson, Jas. Reilley, H. T. McKoy, A. Adrian, C. H. Robinson, J. I. Macks and W. G. MacRae. A ballot was had. The Stedman delegates receiving 103 votes and the Waddell delegates 95. **FIFTH WARD.** The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock, and on motion of G. W. W. Davis, F. H. Darby, Esq., was elected permanent Chairman of the meeting. On motion, Mr. P. T. Dixey was elected permanent Secretary. The following resolution was then offered and carried. Resolved, That the Chairman appoint seven delegates, including himself, to represent the Democratic voters of the Fifth Ward in the Democratic County Convention. Under the above resolution the delegates appointed were as follows: F. H. Darby, W. H. Goodman, G. W. W. Davis, J. D. H. Klaunder, A. H. Leslie, J. J. Dixey, and P. T. Dixey. Under a similar resolution F. H. Darby and P. T. Dixey were appointed to represent the Fifth Ward in the County Democratic Executive Committee. A resolution was offered and carried that the delegation vote as a unit in the Democratic County Convention. Another meeting of the Fifth Ward Democratic voters was held at the old hall of the Bucket Company, a report of which is given below, as furnished by the Secretary. A meeting of the Fifth ward Democratic voters was held in accordance with the call of the Executive Committee. T. W. Player, Esq., was called to the Chair, and Mr. John J. King elected Secretary. Appropriate resolutions were read and adopted to the feeling of the Ward, and complimentary resolutions in favor of Col. Waddell and in favor of the encouragement of the laboring element of the Democratic party were adopted. Delegates to the County Convention were elected as follows: Jordan W. Branch, Eli H. Davis, C. L. Burkheimer, Sam'l Mintz, T. B. Burnett, Joel Farrow, Zach. Hussey. County Executive Committee—Wilkes Morris, W. E. Mayo. A meeting of Democratic voters of Masonboro township was held yesterday at the old J. T. George place yesterday afternoon. The meeting was, so we have been informed, not well attended. On motion of Mr. R. E. Heide, the meeting came to order by Mr. Farrow taking the chair. The Chairman stated the object of the meeting, when the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the Chairman of this meeting shall appoint seven delegates, including himself, to represent this township in the approaching County Convention. Under the said resolution the Chairman appointed the following delegates: John A. Farrow, Wm. Martin, Frank Beasley, Bradley George, R. E. Heide, John Craig, and A. D. Cazaux. The appointments were thereupon ratified by the meeting. The following resolutions were offered and adopted: Resolved, That the delegates appointed to the County Democratic Convention by us, the Democratic voters of Masonboro township, are hereby required and directed to vote for and support all such measures as may promote the nomination of Maj. Chas. M. Stedman for Congress. Resolved, That the delegates appointed by the meeting shall, in every instance, vote as a unit. On motion the meeting then adjourned. **HARNETT TOWNSHIP.** At a meeting of the Democratic voters of Harnett township, held at Macomber's, on yesterday, John L. Corbett, Tobias Carney, John T. Flowers, J. W. Murrell, James Smith, D. D. Futch and D. Funnell were duly elected delegates to represent the township in the county convention of the Democratic party in New Hanover county, to be held in the city of Wilmington, on Saturday, the 4th day of May, 1878. For executive committeeman Gerrit Walker was duly elected.

RECAPITULATION. The First, Second and Third Wards elected Waddell delegates; the Fourth Ward elected Stedman delegates, and the Fifth Ward elected two sets of delegates, one set for Waddell and the other for Stedman, Masonboro and Harnett townships, elected Stedman delegates.

Superior Court. The "Kahnweiler case" has occupied the attention of the court for two days, but was dismissed for the term to-day, because of a mistrial. The jury after being out all night and up to 10 o'clock to-day were discharged. West vs Hussell, was next called. A verdict in favor of plaintiff was rendered, \$56.25. Vollers vs Gerken, was to have been called at 3 o'clock this afternoon.
