> The following is a further extract from Bishop Atkinson's address: "We should remember that in christian education, the right training of the mind and the heart is not needed for girls only, but at least, as much for boys and youths. It was to meet this want that the Wilbeforce School at Morganton has been planned and we must acknowledge that not very much has been done as yet to accomplish this plan. A Serious Difficulty.

The lobe of the left ear was found to be badly cut and under it there was a deep gash extending for about two inches, besides two smaller wounds in the right side. He bled very profusely and we are satisfied that nothing less than Dr. Bellamy's early arrival on the scene saved his life. The wounds were inflicted by a two-edged, ivory handled instrument resembling a paper scraper, which was found on the
