It would be present to buyers an article of the most perishable nature, yet no provision is made to keep it from that quick agent of decay, the sun. They pay for the privilege of standing with their carts unsheltered in the hottest place in the city of Wilmington, and have to take the risk of losing their fish if purchasers are not promptly on hand to take them away. Why cannot our city fathers give them some sort of cheap shelter at the foot of the market, under which to drive their loads and keep their fish from spoiling?

We call the attention of our ever efficient authorities to this subject and hope they will find a remedy.

Pender County Commissioners.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board was held at Burgaw yesterday, when the following proceedings were had.

Ordered, That the matter of pump for the county be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

Ordered, That the case of Mrs. Malpass be referred to Commissioner Armstrong with power to act.

Ordered, That S. H. Bell be granted retail liquor licenses for three months at Burgaw from the first of June, Commissioner Shaw voting against allowing the license.

Ordered, That the communication of W. J. Hicks relative to civil engineer on the Duplin branch canal be placed on file.

Ordered, That the county sell alternate lots of the county land.

Ordered, That the auctioneer be instructed not to cry a bid less than \$10. Commissioner Humphry voting in the negative.

Ordered, That J. H. Teinken be granted retail liquor license at Burgaw for three months, Commissioner Shaw voting in the negative.

The Board then resolved into a board of assessors and adopted the following uniform scale of valuation: Horses: No. 1, \$100; No. 2, \$75; No. 3, \$50. Mules: No. 1, \$100; No. 2, \$75; No. 3, \$50. Cows and oxen: No. 1, \$30; No. 2, \$25; No. 3, \$15. Hogs: No. 1, sow and pigs; \$10; No. 2 \$5; dry hogs, \$1 per head. Sheep and goats: \$1. Corn, 60 cts per bushel; fodder 60 cts per hundred; peanuts, 50 cts per bushel. Bacon, 6 cts per pound.

Ordered, That B. K. Bryan having been appointed by Judge Eure on the 22nd of May and by Judge McKoy on the 30th of May as Clerk of the Supreme Court for Pender county, that his bond be accepted and placed on file.

Ordered, That the bills of Isaac James, Coroner, be taken up immediately after the reading of the minutes at next meeting.

The Board then adjourned. Sampson Superior Court, His Honor Judge Eure presiding, is in session this week at Clinton.

Hon. A. M. Waddell left here last evening on his return to his duties in Washington City.

Weather Report.

The indications of the weather, as received at the Signal Office in this city at 10 o'clock this forenoon, are as follows: In the South Atlantic and East Gulf States falling and stationary, followed by rising barometer, warmer Southwest bearing to cooler Northwest or Northeast winds and partly cloudy weather will prevail, with rain areas.

Escape of a Prisoner.

Gen. S. H. Manning, Sheriff of this county, offers a reward of \$25 for the capture of Bill Robeson, colored, an escaped prisoner. Robeson was on trial yesterday before the Criminal Court on a charge of larceny and while being conveyed back to the jail escaped from the officer who had him in charge and dashed off. After a long chase he managed to make good his escape and hence the reward offered for his capture.

Board of Aldermen.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon, and the following is a transcript of the proceedings.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Mrs. Robert Strange, reported progress.

The petition of T. J. Southerland, in reference to the erection of a wooden building on a lot on Second street, between Princess and Chesnut streets, was granted, on condition that the building shall be only one story, with a fire-proof roof.

The petition of W. S. F. E. Co. No. 1 was referred to the Mayor and Alderman Bowden, with power to act.

The Committee on Streets and Wharves reported progress in reference to the petition on wharfage on rafts. Also on the sidewalks on Mulberry and Walnut streets. Also the opening of Ninth at Fanning street.

The same committee reported in reference to opening the alley between Harnett and Bladen streets, that it be not granted. Report adopted.

The special committee appointed to confer with the authorities of the C. C. Railway Company, in reference to a contemplated removal of the machine shops of said Company, reported that they are informed by said authorities that they have no idea of removing the shops at present.

The following resolution, offered by Alderman Flanner, was adopted:

"In consequence of the stringency in monetary affairs, and the general depression of business, it is hereby ordered that the penalty of twenty-per cent. for non payment of back taxes on real estate, be, and the same is hereby, remitted on all such delinquents as may pay the full amount of all back taxes due the city within the next ensuing sixty days."

The third paragraph of section 3 of the Tax Ordinance was amended to read as follows:

Stocks of all incorporated companies and banks doing business in this city shall be taxed 1 1/2 per cent. on the market value thereof, in excess of the assessed value of real estate and personal property listed by such company or bank. Stock to be given in by the Treasurer or other authorized officer of such company or bank.

The section in relation to banks and bankers was amended so as to read "shall pay \$20 (twenty dollars) per month."

Petitions from sundry citizens in reference to sidewalks on Fourth street, between Castle and Wooster streets; also sidewalk on Red Cross street, were referred to the Chief of Police.

Petition from D. O'Connor and F. W. Kerchner, in reference to the erection of a wooden building on the corner of Fifth and Ann streets was granted.

The contract for feeding and shoeing the city mules, keeping carts and harness in repair, and furnishing drivers, was awarded to T. J. Southerland for \$32.50 per month for each mule and cart.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

The Sale at Burgaw.

The sale of lots belonging to the county, yesterday at Burgaw, was well attended and the bidding was lively and spirited. In all, 44 lots were sold at prices varying from \$15 to \$75 each. The aggregate amount of the sale, for the 44 lots, was \$1,511.25. This was doing extremely well and everybody was satisfied. The balance of the 150 lots advertised will probably not be sold until next Fall.

Criminal Court.

The first case for trial to-day was State vs. Jno. W. Foley and William Yearly, for an affray. Foley submitted and Yearly was acquitted; judgment in Foley's case was suspended on payment of costs.

State and George West, vs. W. H. Moore for assault and battery, dismissed at prosecutor's cost.

State vs. W. H. Moore, on a peace warrant, dismissed on payment of costs.

State vs. Thomas Hines, assault and battery, found guilty. Judgment not yet passed.

State vs. Thomas Hines, for trespass, verdict not guilty.

State vs. Gaston Merrick, for an assault, verdict not guilty.

The above cases were disposed of this forenoon. At 10 o'clock the court adjourned to meet at 3 p. m., at which time the calendar was taken up and the docket proceeded with.

Will Leave Us.

The U. S. steam Revenue Cutter Colfax, Captain Frank Barr, Commander leaves here to-morrow morning at five o'clock for New York, whither she has been ordered to undergo repairs. During the few short months that Captain Barr and the officers of his ship have been on this station they have won hosts of friends, who will be loth to part with them even for the short period of three months that must elapse before their ship is ready to head South again. We utter no fulsome praise, and only speak the sentiments of our community when we say that the gentlemanly officers of this ship will be parted with with regret by their many friends here, and their name is legion. We wish the officers one and all bon voyage and a speedy return, but especially do we extend our heartiest well wishes to Capt. Barr, Lieutenant Rhodes and Messrs. Coffin and French. Gentlemen adieu!

Flemington and Waccamaw Lake.

In connection with the announcement of Col. A. Pope of an excursion train to Waccamaw Lake weekly, we wish to add that the lake was never more beautiful or attractive than at this time. The white perch have begun to school and can be seen going in schools of say six or eight hundred, in various parts of the lake. One party recently complained, that with but little bait and no experience as a fisherman, he only caught eighty-six perch in two hours, when it seems as if the whole lake was but a mass of fish around him. It is also to be noticed that Mrs. Brothers, who keeps the Hotel at Flemington, has lately much improved it and is provided with everything to make her guests comfortable, besides which she has brought her prices down to suit the times and her charges are as low as at any hotel anywhere, fifty cents per meal being the average.

All who want a day's fun, write to Nick Carroll to have boats, bait and lines ready on your arrival, go out and try the lake until evening—eat your fish, get a good room, take a night's rest and return in the morning train next day, getting in town in time for breakfast and business.

The Rowing Race this Afternoon.

The rowing race between the boats Little Katie and White Swan, which is to take place at 6 o'clock this afternoon, will no doubt be an exciting and pleasant one. The crews are in active training and the boats are in fine trim. The Little Katie is 21 feet 3 inches in length and carries 10 feet oars. The crew is as follows:

J. W. Bowles, No. 1, L. S. F. Brown, 2, W. J. Gordon, 3, G. Herring, 4, J. N. Anderson, Coxswain.

The White Swan is 28 feet long and carries 12 feet oars. Her crew is as follows:

P. Jones, No. 1, Capt. Jno Harper, 2, J. M. Cronly, 3, R. B. Taylor, 4, Coxswain T. W. Moore.

The course to be rowed is thought to be about four miles, being from Market Dock to a buoy opposite Kidder's mill and return, the crews to exchange boats immediately and repeat the course.

Messes Norwood Giles and Walter Coney have been appointed judges.

City Court.

Wesley Spearman, a colored boy, was arraigned for disorderly conduct. The evidence adduced in this case proved that the defendant has a habit of going from house to house begging, and when he is refused anything, retreats to a safe distance and then opens his vial of wrath and emits a volume of abuse upon the heads of those who send him away empty handed. The Mayor sentenced him to ten days in the City prison.

The next case on docket was that of Lizzie Allen, arrested in the neighborhood of the "Long House," on Surry street, for disorderly conduct, cursing and swearing and using obscene language on the street. Mayor Fishplate said \$15, or fifteen days in the City Prison, was the penalty in such a case. The defendant was locked up. This finished the business for the day, and the Court adjourned.
