Body Recovered.

and the entire white force of infantry was organized into three battalions. The battalion organizations were com-

pleted on the 10th of April, 1877, less than thirty days after the passage of the act establishing the State Guard. On the 8th day of November the colored companies were formed into two battalons of infantry, designated the fourth and fifth battalions.

The first encampment of the State Guard was held at Raleigh, the 16th, 17th, and 18th of October, on the occasion of the State Fair. The troops were transported free by the several railroad companies; they were comfortably quartered at Camp Russell, used as a barrack since the war, by the United States troops, and turned over to the State by the Federal authorities for this special occasion; the men subsisted themselves, the contingent expenses of the encampment being defrayed by private contributions from certain public-spirited citizens.

Only once during the year were the services of the State Guard needed. It was on the occasion of the hanging of Hilliard Morgan, at Goldsboro, 20th December.

During the year, but one company was mustered out of the State Guard, the Buncombe Riflemen, Company D., of the Third Battalion.

The results have been achieved in less than nine months, in the face of many difficulties, and without moneyed aid from the State or the Federal government, beyond the mere pittance expended in this office. Considering the lack of government help, and the effect of the depression in business upon an organization which is maintained almost wholly by the expenditure of time and money on the part of its individuals; and bearing in

mind the apathy in military matters that necessarily fol lowed the passing away of the excitement created and sustained by the late war, I think we have good cause for congratulation at the progress made by the State Guard in the first year of its existance. It is gratifying too, to observe that it is steadily growing in popularity. Already it may be fairly claimed that it is an organization of which the State may feel proud.
