Wilmington District Conference. We have been requested to state that arrangements have been made with the Wilmington & Weldon and Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railways by which upon the payment of one fare, return tickets will be granted ministers, delegates and visitors attending the Wilmington District Conference of the Methodist E. The Yacht Race. The weather and wind for the Yacht Race this afternoon was very propitious, a stiff, steady wind blowing from the southwest. Large crowds covered the wharves, tops of houses and piazzas on the river front. The steam yacht *Passport* and steam-tug *Wm. Nyce*, gaily decked in flags of different nationalities, followed the yachts through the course and were each well loaded with eager spectators. Before the race commenced pools were selling on the wharves giving the *Rosa* first choice, *Foam* second and *Ripple* third. A greater interest was manifested in the race this afternoon than any we have ever witnessed. The yachts started from the opposite side of the river in the following order:

The start made by the yachts was a beautiful one. The *Rosa* ran far ahead of the fleet when about two-thirds down the river on the first stretch and the *Ripple* passed the *Frolic*. The *Foam* passed the *Bonnie Lassie* and the next tack the *Frolic* passed well to the windward of the *Ripple*. The yachts rounded the buoy in the following order and time, (as taken by witnesses on the *Passport*):

Soon after passing the Dram Tree Buoy the *Ripple* ran up her "help me long" and in a few minutes passed the *Frolic*. The *Rosa* rounded the home buoy on the first stretch 13 1/2 minutes ahead of the *Ripple* and 2 minutes ahead of the *Frolic* which was closely followed by the *Foam*.

The *Rosa* rounded the Dram Tree buoy and started on the home stretch first, keeping well ahead of the fleet and passed the home buoy about twenty to twenty-three minutes ahead of her competitors. The *Rosa's* actual sailing time was 2 h, 18 m, 13 s.

The *Ripple* was ahead of the *Foam* and it was the opinion of the judges, Messrs. G. A. Peck and Edward Lattimer that the *Ripple* would win the second and the *Foam* the 3d prizes. The *Rosa* was the only boat which had come in up to the of our going to press.

Pleasant Excursion. Capt. James W. Lippitt advertises in this issue another of his pleasant excursions to Smithville on the steamer *J. S. Underhill* for Thursday next. Capt. Lippitt invariably gets up nice excursions, and none leaving this city are ever pleasanter than his. Music, dancing and refreshments are offered, and upon arriving at Smithville excursionists can dance, lounge on the green sward of the garrison, or take a plunge in the salt water. What can be pleasanter?

The Fish Market of Wilmington. From the reports of all interested in the business as well as from our own observation it is evident that our market is now better supplied with fish than at any previous year since the memory of the oldest inhabitant. Not only have we been bountifully supplied with the varieties to which we have ever been accustomed, but within the past two years the famous codfish and mackerel of our Yankee cousins have migrated to our shores and have been caught from our waters. We enumerate below the variety of the finny tribe which have been offered to our citizens at very reasonable prices during the season. Of the salt water variety we mention pig, flounder, trout, croaker, redmouths, snappers, brim, white perch, sailors choice, mullets, blue fish, Virginia mullets, porgies, sheep head, sun rock, black mackerel, cod or stock, jimmy's cats and drum, and of the fresh water variety, perch, trout suckers, grindle, pike, shad, herring and sturgeon. A great many of the different kinds of fish have been shipped to our less fortunate neighbors along the lines of the railroads and a large business has been done in shipping sturgeon to Northern markets. The market has been abundantly supplied with crabs and shrimps, and the supply of terrapins and turtles has exceeded the demand for them. Clams and oysters have also been brought to market in profusion and some few scallops. In fact Wilmington can boast of a very fine fish market and has been able to spare a good quantity of the fish for shipment.
