THE FIGHT AT BURGAW.

Heaton Hits Foster and Foster Shoots at Heaton—Both Parties Under Bonds.

BURGAW, N. C., July 2, 1878.

The Radical Nominating Convention for the Senatorial District composed of New Hanover and Pender counties, is in session here to-day, and among others, the various candidates are present. This morning, while one of these candidates, Flavie W. Foster, of your city, was engaged in conversation with some colored men, James Heaton walked up in the rear of him and struck him two blows with a stick, staggering him, whereupon Foster drew a revolver and fired two shots at Heaton, but without effect. Other parties then interfered and Justice Bloodworth immediately issued warrants of arrest for both parties, and after a preliminary examination, bound them over in bonds of \$250 each, for their appearance at the next term of the Superior Court.

The Convention is now in session, and there is no nomination for Senator as yet.

[Mr. Foster seems to have been forewarned in regard to this attack and to have therefore been prepared for it. From gentlemen who arrived here this morning from Rocky Point we learn that Heaton jumped from the train as it arrived at that place this morning, and stated that he was going to Burgaw and that when he got there he was "going to give Foster the damndest licking he ever had." Some of the latter's friends, who were at Rocky Point, hearing of this telegraphed him at Burgaw and put him on his guard.—REVIEW.]

Board of Aldermen.

The regular monthly session of the Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon; present, His Honor the Mayor, and Aldermen Bowden, Flanner, Von-Glahn, Vollers, Foster and Lowrey.

The Committee appointed to consult the city attorney in reference to the validity of the contract with T. J. Southerland, reported that it was the opinion of the city attorney that the city could not annul the contract save for cause.

A communication from the Board of Audit and Finance was read.

Alderman Foster presented a petition signed by boys, asking to be allowed to bathe on the shoals in the river in front of the W. & W. R. R. Tabled.

The report of the Superintendent of Health for the month of May was read and ordered to be placed on file.

A communication from the Superintendent of Health was referred to the Sanitary Committee.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

The lodge is in a very flourishing condition and its ranks are being rapidly swollen.

Found Dead.

We understand that a white man, a German, by the name of Jor. H. Baerman, was found dead near Burgaw yesterday morning. He was discovered lying on his face, dead, and with a bunch of grass clutched in his hand. A few papers, written in German, were found on his person and a scrip of paper directed to W. H. Portey, or Pomey, care of Hart & Bailey, Wilmington. Coroner James held an inquest and the jury rendered a verdict that he came to his death from causes to them unknown.

We made numerous enquires here this morning but could elicit no information in regard to the deceased. There is no such person at Hart & Bailey's as is the direction of the letter, and no one there knows anything of the dead man. Inquiries made among a number of German residents were equally fruitless.

City Court.

Geo. Vann, colored, was arraigned before the Mayor this morning on the charge of disorderly conduct—\$2 50 fine or two days in the City Prison was the result of the trial.

Albert Gandvose, white, was entered on the docket of the Clerk for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and was the next case on docket to be tried, but the defendant was said by one of the officers of the court to be in a very non-presentable condition, so to speak, as he had disrobed himself completely and entirely of every thread of clothing, some of which he tore in pieces. In this condition the Chief thought it advisable not to bring the defendant before the Court. The same party had been arrested the day previous on a similar charge of drunkenness, and the case dismissed owing to the fact that the defendant seemed to be an unsophisticated creature from the country. But since his last arrest the officers at the City Hall are of the opinion that this man is suffering under temporary insanity. The Mayor allowed the case to go over until to-morrow and then adjourned the Court.

SCHEDULE B TAX!

ALL WHOLESALE and Retail Merchants are hereby notified that a privilege tax was levied by the Legislatures of 1875, 1876 and 1877, of Five Dollars, (the same levied by county), in addition to the Schedule taxes proper. Wholesale dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases, made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits, turpentine, resin and naval stores of any kind and cotton.) All hotels, boarding houses, restaurants and eating houses are required by law to pay a tax of one-half per cent on gross receipts. The tax will be due July 1st, and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of January, 1878.

All parties interested in the payment of Schedule B Taxes will save costs by attending to the same at once, as the law will be strictly enforced, and owing to the small amount collected on the above schedule for criticism years and the numerous complaints upon the returns given in by parties in business, I am prompted to request that you be careful in making up correct and positive returns, thereby relieving me of the unpleasant duty enjoined upon me of looking over your books and invoices. In this connection it is especially and particularly enjoined upon you that all purchases made by you from, through or by Brokers must be included by you in your returns. J. E.
