**NOT CRAZY.**

Albert Gandoise, white, was examined this morning by Dr. A. E. Wright City Physician before Justices Wagner and Hall to ascertain if he was a fit subject for an Insane Asylum, but was pronounced to be all right and perfectly sane; only suffering from the effects of too much alcohol imbibed a day or so ago. He will be furnished transportation beyond the city limits.

**Was It a Fit?**

About 2 o'clock, this morning, officer Greene, of the police, found a woman on Nutt street whose actions were such that he felt called upon to take her in custody, but a man by the name of Johnson, a Dane, claimed the woman as his wife and said that she had a fit, and that if the officer would assist him in taking her home, he would take care for her. The officer very kindly consented, but at the foot of Walnut street, her condition became such that she had to be taken up bodily and carried to her residence, between Walnut and Red Cross streets. Officer Green, from whom we gather the above facts, was undecided whether the woman was actually in a fit or intoxicated, though he could discover no odor of whiskey.

**Crossing the Big Pond**

We have been permitted to publish the following extract from a private letter, written by one of the passengers on the barque *North Carolina*, which carried out from Wilmington, four gentlemen, bound for the Paris Exposition, describing the voyage across the Atlantic:

"I will try to give you a short account of our passage. We left the bar on Sunday morning (May 19th) at 10 o'clock, and the next day were North of Hatteras; here we met a Northwest wind, which was very cold, and by the time we had reached the Banks of Newfoundland, the cold was intense—the thermometer falling to 44 degrees. Off the Banks we experienced a gale of wind which lasted three days; but as our vessel was staunch, we were able to stand our course; we cared little for the blow and knotted 617 miles. The weather continued extremely cold and disagreeable for the whole passage. Our passenger list comprised four gentlemen from Wilmington and an old Scotch gentleman from Fayetteville, who is so thoroughly identical with the O. J. North State, that this is his first visit to his native land after an absence of forty-one years. Our accommodations on the barque were as nice and comfortable as could be desired, and Captain Buchan did all that man could do to render our stay on board agreeable and pleasant. He never tired of doing for us. Everything he had was open to us—always amiable, polite and obliging, he was ever ready to impart information or instruction in the pleasantest manner possible. And I may add that no one is more competent to instruct in his profession than Capt. Buchan, who is a first rate mathematician, a capital navigator, and a thorough seaman, besides being a practical ship builder of large experience. He drew the contract, plan and specifications for building the *North Carolina*, and she shows how thorough he is in every thing. Fitted with iron masts and yards and wire rigging, an improved patented pump of great power to pump out water that should happen to get into her hold—if such a thing is probable for as yet she has never leaked a drop—with a watertight compartment at the bow, an elegant cabin, and complete galley, the *North Carolina* is as safe and convenient as could be desired. As a sailor, the *North Carolina*, though not a clipper, will still rank high. She made the run from bar to bar in 23 days and 17 hours and invariably ran out of sight astern every vessel with which we fell in. I can only say that the vessel is worthy of her worthy captain; a man who by his uniform courtesy, urbanity and gentleness and his never-ending desire and efforts to add to our comfort and pleasure and his sterling qualities as a seaman inspired us all with the greatest respect and esteem.

**Meeting of County Commissioners.**

The Board met yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, all the members being present but Commissioner Holmes.

It was ordered that ten days more be given in which to list taxes, on application to the Register of Deeds, and all who fail to list at the expiration of that time will be put on the delinquent list.

It was also ordered that \$1,000 of the general school fund, which has come into hand since the last apportionment, be apportioned to meet present demands.

Several matters in relation to taxes were then considered, and the Board adjourned.

**Republican Senatorial Convention at Burgaw.**

The Republican bow-wow which met at Burgaw yesterday, the scene of the late conflict between two prominent Republicans of this city, agreed to centre upon James Wilson as the dark horse to trot over the State Senatorial course in this district the first Thursday in next month. J. P. Sampson, colored, who was recommended by the Republican convention of New Hanover county as candidate for this nomination, was defeated, but was recommended and endorsed by the Burgaw convention as a suitable candidate for the Congressional honors from this district.

**The Family Excursion.**

The preparations have been completed and the Grand Family Excursion to be given to-morrow on board the commodious steamer *Gov. Worth* to Smithville, promises to be one of the most pleasant affairs known here in many years. Those who wish to take advantage of the holiday to get away from the city and yet who may desire to go with an especially select crowd will find no better opportunity than this. The boat will leave wharf between Market and Dock Street, at 9 o'clock, sharp.

**Family Excursion.**

A number of heads of families here, wishing to avoid the crowd usually attending a Fourth of July excursion, have chartered the steamer *Underhill* for a private family excursion and she will leave her wharf, foot of Orange Street, at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning, for Smithville.

It is not designed to interfere with any other excursion as none but the subscribers and their families will be allowed on board and yet it promises to be a staid, settled, and sober affair from the fact that upon the subscription list is enrolled the names of a Deacon and three or four Elders.

**Preventing Sea-Sickness.**

Of the many annoyances to which the travelling public is subject at this particular season, sea-sickness is, perhaps, the most distressing. A perfect cure for this malady would rob ocean travel of half its terrors. No drug, however, has been discovered which acts as a specific. The cause of the sickness is largely, if not wholly, due to the involuntary and unexpected motions to which the passenger is subjected on board ship. These cause undue pressure upon the stomach and liver, and derange the action of those organs. To prevent this, attention has recently been called to an old plan, which is said to be very successful, and which we publish for the benefit of those who may go down to the sea on steamboats from this port. It consists in regulating the act of breathing according to the pitching or rolling of the vessel, drawing in the breath as she rises, and breathing out as she falls into the trough of the waves. After a little experience, the practice, it is said, becomes involuntary. When sea-sickness has fairly set in, the only thing to be done is to get rid of the extra bile thrown into circulation, and to allay the irritation of the stomach. For the latter, brandy is the popular remedy, but cool effervescent drinks are preferable. In particular, champagne has been commended as the best medicine to subdue nausea, and give the necessary tone and stimulus to the system.
