The Colored Military.

We neglected to notice in Saturday's issue the parade of the colored military Companies in this city, on the evening previous. In addition to the Companies in this city, the Lincoln Light Infantry, a military organization from Charlotte, were also in line, the battalion being under command of the Lieut.-Colonel, Geo. L. Mabson. They presented a very attractive and a very creditable appearance, and the different commands were executed with a precision which evidenced the careful drill to which they had been subjected. Their good behavior on the streets was the theme of general comment among the white citizens.

The Visitors from Sumter.

We understand that the Sumter Light Infantry, who are to visit our city next week, en route for Smithville, will be received at the depot by the white military companies here and the usual courtesies shown them. The Sumter military will also be accompanied by a number of prominent citizens of that town, with their families, and we presume that some attentions will be extended them by our people. They will all go down the river directly after their arrival--the civilians for a day's pleasure, and the company for a week's stay at Smithville.

Disgraceful!

Let two little boys throw rocks on the streets, and forthwith they are hauled up and fined or paddled. Let two gentlemen agree to disagree and make two or three ineffectual passes at each other and forthwith a runner for somebody, with an eye single to the costs in the case, makes an affidavit and the parties are arrested, taxed for the costs and bound over for appearance. Mr. Solicitor Moore, your attention is called to the fact that the peace and dignity of the State were endangered last Saturday in a difficulty between two Radical politicians and no arrests were made. The law abiding people of this city want to know if an indictment cannot lie against them in the Criminal Court, other authorities having by their inaction signified their unwillingness to make the arrests.

The Pender Democrats

The Democrats in Pender county have been in session to-day for the purpose of nominating candidates for county offices. A full result at this writing has not been reached but we learn just before going to press that Mr. A. H. Padlison, the present popular and efficient Sheriff, has been nominated for re-election to that office and on the second ballot.

City Court.

A colored feminine by the name of Katy King was arrested Saturday night for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and afforded the policeman who made the arrest all the amusement he wanted in the way of taking care of her while conducting her to the city prison. This morning Mayor Fishblade remarked ten days in the city prison, he thought, would do and then stepped down and out for the day.

Schooner Yacht.

The schooner yacht Little Ida, Captain Chas. Hafke, from Baltimore, for Jacksonville, Fla., sailed up to the wharf Saturday afternoon. The Little Ida is a model of compactness, and is fitted up in as nice a manner as is possible. She is 18 feet on the keel, 6 feet 8 inches beam. She is made of galvanized iron, and is supplied with air cans at the bow and stern. All her rigging runs aft, and she can be handled by one man in the cabin. Her wheel is in the cabin, and also most of her cloats. She left Baltimore on the 29th of June and has stopped at most points of interest. Capt. Hafke says she is the nicest sea boat he ever saw. He thinks of proceeding on his voyage to-morrow.

There was a disturbance late Saturday afternoon, on the corner of Princess and Second streets, between James Heaton and Dan Howard, in which the latter fired at Heaton and missed him. There were a number of persons passing at the time and it is providential that none of them were struck by the ball. Naturally, one would suppose that the arrest of the offending parties would have immediately followed but, strange to say, it did not, nor has it yet taken place. A Republican Justice of the Peace was, we understand, on the ground and took his friend Heaton off but no warrant was issued. Why not? The difficulty occurred within a stone's throw of the City Hall and yet there were no arrests by the police force. Why not? We propound these inquiries in behalf of the law-abiding people of this city who do not desire to see the disgraceful scenes of the first Thursday in August, 1874, again enacted on our streets.
