WAR DEPARTMENT. Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington D. C., July 11—10 A. M.

A Colored Congressman.

At the meeting of the Republican convention for the Second Congressional District, held yesterday at Goldsboro, J. A. O'Hara, colored, from Halifax, was nominated. The other candidates were Ex-Gov. Brogden, present Congressman, Col. Lott W. Humphrey and W. P. Mabson, colored. O'Hara's nomination in that district is equivalent to an election, provided there are no other candidates in his own party.

Col. E. R. Brink and W. P. Canaday, Esq. returned here last evening from Raleigh, whither they had been assisting in a caucus of leading Republicans in the State in regard to the political situation. This caucus was held on Tuesday and we learn that it was determined not to make any nominations for this campaign on the State ticket, a wise conclusion, we cannot but think. There is no doubt, however, that the energies and means thus saved will be vigorously applied elsewhere and we think, from what we can learn, that the great fight of the campaign with them is to be located in the first Congressional district. ## A Rainbow

The time of day at which a rainbow appears is generally regarded by farmers, shepherds and others accustomed to outdoor work as a weather sign; thus, if it appear in the morning it is looked upon as the precursor of wet and stormy weather, but if it appear in the evening then it is thought to precede dry and fine weather; hence the following doggerel:

"Rainbow in the morning Sailors warning; Rainbow at night Shepherd's delight."

Meteorologists tell us that there is some truth in this popular notion, and the reasons they give are these: A rainbow in the morning is seen in the west when the east is clear. It is indicative of the advance of the rain-cloud toward the observer, and, moreover, from the time at which it happens—morning—it points to the increasing moisture of the atmosphere.

Wet and stormy weather is the natural sequence of such a conjuncture of circumstances. On the other hand when a rainbow appears in the east when the west is clear, the rain-clouds are receding from the observer, and the atmosphere is becoming drier. Fine weather necessarily follows.

## Foul Murder in Columbus.

From a correspondent, who was on the scene of the tragedy yesterday, we learn the following particulars of a murder most foul, which occurred day-before-yesterday, (Tuesday), in Columbus county, very near the South Carolina line:

On the 9th of July, Stephen Foley, of South Carolina, was shot dead by Wiley Ganus, of Columbus Co., N. C., under the following circumstances: A [Mrs. Stricklin, who lives very near the State line, had sold to Wiley Ganus the apples in a large apple orchard near her house. Foley, who lives in South Carolina, about five hundred yards from Mrs. Stricklin's, came over to her house and and finding Ganus in the orchard gathering the apples immediately set up a claim to them and ordered Ganus to desist from work his work of gathering and leave the orchard. This Ganus refused to do and a quarrel ensued bitter and full of threats on both sides, till at last Ganus caught up his double-barrel gun, which was leaning against a tree, and shot Foley, killing him instantly. Ganus then escaped over the line, and up to this time has not been taken. The Coroner is investigating the matter but the verdict of the jury cannot materially alter the facts as above stated.

## Stabbed in the Foot.

This morning, just before nine o'clock, a young negro boy, Jim Everett, was cut in the foot by Ed Hill, also colored, and about the same age. Hill was seated on the curb stone on the South side of Market, between Second and Third streets, eating a canteloupe when Everett approached him and asked for a piece. The boys commenced playing with each other and finally Everett kicked at Hill, who cut at him with a knife, the blade entering the instep of Everett's foot.

Hill was very much frightened and ran. Everett was carried on a dray to Dr. W. W. Lane's office where the wound was dressed. Dr. Lane does not think it serious, but much depends upon the dressing of the foot by the boy's parents.

## Brown Bread.

## Annual Regatta.

The Masonboro Canoe Club had their annual regatta over the course on Masonboro Sound on yesterday, the distance sailed being about two and one-half miles. The Club is composed of juveniles on the Sound, none of them being over thirteen years of age. The following canoes entered:

*Stormy Petrel*—Capt. Henry Savage, Jr. *Skip Jack*—Capt. Victor Grainger. *Lucy*—Capt. Ed. Daniel.

*Anna McKay*—Capt. Wm. Parsley. *Carrie*—Cap. Ed. Cazaux.

The canoes made fine starts, and for their size and under the circumstances, made very good time.

The champion flag and first prize, a sheath knife and sheath, was awarded to the *Anna McKay*.

Second prize, a handsome pearl-handled pocket-knife, to the *Stormy Petrel*.

Third prize, a fishing line, to the *Carrie*.

Fourth prize, (slowest boat) an anchor rope, to the *Skip Jack*.

During the race the *Lucy* filled and withdrew and while the *Skipjack* was rounding the lower buoy, she upset, was hauled ashore and bailed out and went into the race again. There was as much discussion and the race seemed to be in as much doubt as was the last race of the Carolina Yacht Club. The commanders appealed from the judge's decision and agreed to leave the matter to Commodore Grainger and had their crafts drawn up in front of the Commodore's bath house awaiting his arrival, and in the meantime the Captains of the canoes went in bathing where they were found by the Commodore. He addressed them from the gangway, confirming the judge's decision, but with this the juveniles were dissatisfied and will now leave the matter to an Electoral Commission.

## Horrible If True.

We hear, though we do not vouch for the truthfulness of the statement, that a young man, some few miles in the country, offered to bet ten dollars the other day that he could swallow an umbrella which he held in his hand, clear up to the handle. A man present bet ten dollars that the young man could not perform the feat and the money was deposited in the hands of a bystander. The young man did swallow the umbrella, which made the man who had bet that he could not, so angry at the idea of the loss of his ten dollars, that he seized the projecting handle of the umbrella, and running his hand up to the slide, opened it to its fullest extent, and now it is found impossible to close the umbrella, and the poor victim will have to go until his dying day with a blue cotton umbrella wide open inside of him.

## The C. C. & A. R. R.

We made a short reference yesterday to the fact that the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta R. R. seems about to pass into the hands of those magnificent Virginians who control the destinies of our own State road, the N. C. R. R., by means of a lease contracted with an infamous Radical, Wm. A. Smith, of Johnston county, and to-day we republish here what the *Charlotte Observer* has to say about it:

It is currently reported and believed here that the Richmond & Danville Railroad Company is pressing negotiations for the purchase of the Southern Security Company's interest—the controlling interest—in the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad. Some think that the sale has already been made, and that the presence of Col. Buford, the President, and Auditor Barber, together with Col. A. B. Andrews, of the North Carolina division, in Columbia, a few days since, was for the purpose of closing the trade. Confirmation is given this report by the fact, known to some extent, that the Southern Security Company had previously offered to sell the road to the original stockholders at a price considerably below that for which it was purchased from them. The Southern Security Company desiring to sell, the most likely purchaser would be the Richmond & Danville Company, for it gives that company a Southern connection, the importance and value of which at present can hardly be estimated. The Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta road was purchased by the Southern Security Company for the purpose of giving a continuous line from Richmond to Augusta, and thereby gaining a Southern connection at the latter point. This is exactly the use to which it has been put, the upper portion of the road from Columbia to Charlotte being in effect ignored. By this means the Richmond & Danville Railroad was robbed of a connection which had, up to that time, been its main support, and had it not been for the construction of the Air-Line road it would have been in an almost helpless condition, for the C. C. & A. was run in direct opposition.

The new purchase is one of considerable importance, and its effects will be noticed hereafter.

Ed Hill, the boy who stabbed Jim Everett in the foot, was arrested this morning and lodged in the guard house.
